WASHINGTON, 26.—A dispatch of the 20th says it is reported to-night, that the Porto Rico annexation story has truly drawn the fire of Russia and the United States, and was in reality part of a scheme of Bismarck to convulse Europe.

Governor Moses, of South Carolina, this morning, formally made a demand on the President for federal troops to aid him to maintain peace and order in the State.

The following telegram has been received by the President, from Governor Moses of South Carolina:

"Columbia, S. C., Sept. 25, 1874.

"To His Excellency U. S. Grant, President of the United States, Washington, D. C.:

The state of affairs in Edgefield county in this State has been for the last ten days of such a character as to threaten the lives and the destruction of property of law-abiding and peaceful citizens. I have exhausted my efforts, with the peaceful and legal means at my command, to restore the usual situation.

"Gov. of South Carolina."

To which Attorney General Williams, by direction of the President, sent the following reply:

"Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., Sept. 26, 1874:

"To Hon F. J. Moses, Columbia, S. C.:

"I have to say, by direction of the President, in answer to your telegram of yesterday to him, asking for troops to aid in suppressing disorders at Edgefield, that a company of U. S. troops is now stationed there, and it is expected and believed that it will afford adequate protection to the lives and property of citizens."

"GEO. H. WILLIAMS, Attorney General."

ST. PAUL, Minn., 26. — The threshing machine accident at Franklin, briefly alluded to yesterday in these dispatches, was a dreadful affair. The steam thresher belonging to Mr. Borke had been at work threshing, and had nearly completed the job, when all hands stopped for a few minutes, and the machine was standing still, and just as they were about to start it again the boiler of the engine exploded with terrific force, throwing the engine and boiler about 300 feet, and landing it on a stack of straw ten feet high. Three persons were instantly killed and three injured, one of the injured having since died, making four killed. The names of those killed are Mrs. M. Burwick, Miss Katie Devine, Dr. S. Grant, and Perry Borke; injured, Martin Devine, shoulder broken and injured internally, Thos. Cunningham arm nearly torn off, Perry Borke blown about 400 feet from the engine and landed in a marsh. D. Grant and the ladies with him had arrived on the ground to witness the operations of the steam thresher just before the explosion

occurred, and they were almost instantly blown into eternity.

FALL RIVER, Mass., 26.—The Manufacturers' board of trade decided, to-day, to cut down the working hours to three days next week, and to four days in every subsequent week till January.

CHICAGO, 28.—A Washington special says the Louisiana Congressmen here fully confirm the dispatches containing the letters from New Orleans, representing that General Butler and others received fees for defending the Kellogg government here. General Butler claimed \$3,000, but was paid only \$1,000 by Kellogg, and thereafter the record shows, according to date, that Butler voted for Warmouth, and for the impeachment of Judge Durell, and consequently against Kellogg; they also say that Senator Carpenter and Caleb Cushing received only \$5,000 fees for arguing the quo warranto case against Durell in the United States Supreme Court.
