SENATOR BACON

BRINGS ALDRICH TO HIS FEET

Proposed to Exercise His Constitutional Rights Without Hearing Gentleman from Georgia.

Washington, May 28 .-- Senator Aldrich succeeded today in getting action by the senate on the rest of the sugar schedule, with the understanding that the paragraph fixing a duty on raw and refined sugar should be again placed before the senate, if Senator Clay should so improve in health as to permit him to move an amendment cutting the figures in two. The tobacco schedule was also complet-

No changes were made in the finance No enanges were made in the intence committee rates on either schedule. The sugar, the tobacco and agricul-tural schedules divided the attention of the senate, with incidental remarks by Senator Bacon and a general tariff treach by Senator State

by Senator Bacon and a general tariff speech by Senator Stone. Senators Gore, Bristow and Clay criticized the provision for a duty on raw and refined sugar, and Mr. Clay repeated his allegation of fradulent transactions in the interest of the su-gar trust. Mr. Bristow declared that the trust has benefited by the defeat of his amendments vesterday.

of his amendments yesterday. Senator Bacon's remarks consisted of a charge that the reading clerk and the Republican leaders were in

and the Republican leaders were in collusion to shut off debate. Senator Bradley made a long speech advocating the removal of the inter-nal revenue tax of 6 cents a pound on tobacco in "the hand." He asserted such action was essential to the wel-fare of tobacco growers throughout

the country, Senator McCumber spoke in behalf of a protective duty on agricultural products, predicting great tailing off in the American production of wheat in the near future,

BACON CHARGES COLLUSION.

In the senate today Mr. Bacon charged that by collusion between the clerks of that body and Republican senators, cloture had been effected in the senate and the rules of that body nullified. The sugar schedule had been taken up and the senate was about to yote on an amendment offered by Mr. Gore reducing the rate of refined su-

gar to one cent per pound, "Call the roll," the chairman directed, whereupon one of the clerks immediate-

ly started upon that duty. Mr. Bacon at once ordered a halt and, declaring he had addressed the chair before the call had begun, im-mediately entered upon a protest against what he declared was coming to be the practise of the clerk in so promptly beginning his call as to cut off senators who had gained recognition from the privilege of being heard. He declared such a practise was be-coming frequent and asserted that "the clerk is not there as the representative of any party or of any senator, but is here to do his duty and is not entitled to so manipulate the repl. call as it to so manipulate the roll call as to prevent senators from being heard." After being reminded that his amendment provided for a reduction on refined sugar, without an equivalent reduction on crude, Mr. Gore with-drew it in favor of that formerly pre-

sented by M_{T} . Clay, which provided for practically cutting in half the duties of the bill both on raw and refined ugar. Pointing out that this amendment would so reduce the duty on raw sugar as to injure the beet sugar industry, Mr. Bristow protested against it, al-though his course has been to advo-cate a lowering of duties in the bill. The senate paragraph relating to raw

and refined sugar was then adopted as recommended by the finance committee, with the understanding that Mr. Aldrich would ask for a reconsideration when Mr. Clay was prepared to offer and speak on his amendment. The section relating to maple sugar and maple syrup, placing a duty of 4 cents per pound on each, taxing glucose λ_2 -cent per pound and sugar cane in its natural state 20 per cent ad val-orem was agreed to by a viva voce vote

ATTY. WISE INDIGNANT. Dist, Atty. Wise was indignant to-night over the manner in which the United States court and his office had been "flaunted by Heinze," as he ex-pressed it. He referred to it as a "cowboy holdup," and added: "They are going to have a different idea of the way that things may be dome in this jurisdiction these days. They thought in this case that they could take their officers and ship them abroad or put them on a train for Canada and tell us we could not have the books, because they might be in-criminated. But we established a pre-cedent by getting Judge Lacombe to order a meeting of the board of direc-tors forthwith. In all the experience that I have been here, this piece of work is the most damnable I have ever heard of."

STATEMENT BY HEINZE.

F. Augustus Heinze later gave out a statement regarding his action in withholding the books. He said that ever since his first indictment in Jan-uary he has courted the fullest inquiry, and the district attorney, had he so desired would have had full access to all the books and papers of the com-pany with which he was connected. "Notwithstanding this," says the statement, "no such inquiry was made, and my trial had been delayed. "The long delay between the first and second indictments, and the cir-cumstances attending the indictment, convine me that business transactions about which I could not be required to testify against myself are being pried into in an indirect and circuitous way, and it has therefore seemed wise as well as fair to myself, that I should avail myself of my constitutional pri-vilege with reference to books and papers, as well as toy oral testimony." Washington, May 29.—In a bill which gives the federal government jurisdic-tion over the protection of migratory birds, such as ducks, snipe, plover and pigeons, in those states in which the birds do not remain permanently, the entire year, Representative Weeks, of Massachusetts, proposes that the de-partment of agriculture shall establish regulations fixing closed seasons durregulations fixing closed seasons dur-ing which it shall be unlawful to shoot, kill or capture migratory birds.
