LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Socialist state convention will be held in Labor hall at 10 a. m., Aug. 21, and preparations are being made to receive 300 delegates.

Mrs. Charles Stalter will sing "Cast Thy Bread Upon the Waters" as the offertory solo tomorrow morning, at St. Paul's Episcopal church.

Lieut. R. E. Beebe of F company, Twenty-ninth infantry, has gone to Vermont, on a two months' leave of absence, to visit his folks.

The Labor day committee of the Federation of Labor will meet tomorrow morning, to arrange for the annual holiday, Sept. 5, at Calder's park.

Sergeant Frank P. Britton of L company, Twenty-ninth infantry, was honorably discharged yesterday, and left for his home in North Carolina.

Wesley Paul leaves for Tonopah tomorrow, where he will spend one month in writing up the local gold fields for publication with illustrations.

The windows have been placed in the Holmes apartment building, which gives it a much improved appearance. The hard finish on the walls has been completed.

The remains of Michael Killen, the Buckley, Ida, miner, who died of the Buckeye disease, at Holy Cross hospital, were shipped today to Buffalo, N. Y., for interment.

Miss Martha Walters, who has been visiting the world's fair with her cousins, Albert and William Grauer, leaves Sunday for home, while the young men will continue on an eastern trip.

Generous contributions have poured in on the family of Mrs. McKenzie, the four women who suffered from cataplexy the other evening, one being a check for \$50 from Col. E. F. Holmes.

A new local telephone system is being installed at the fort, which will do away with the present pole arrangement, and 12 Bell phones are being placed in various offices and quarters of officers.

President Guinan of All Hallows college has returned from a trip to Washington, and to the world's fair at St. Louis. He was much impressed with the exhibits, particularly the historic display sent on to the Vatican.

The fire macadamized road from the military post to the head of South Temple street has been completed, and is now being used. It is proving a great convenience and a pleasure to citizens driving to and from the fort.

Lynn Bywater, aged 12, son of Joseph C. Bywater, fractured his right shoulder yesterday afternoon, while scrambling down from a tank on which he was standing on Vernon avenue. He will lose the use of his arm for over a month.

The belief stated in yesterday's "News" that Provo would be given this year's militia encampment, proves correct, and Provo was decided on last evening. The guardsmen approve of this choice on account of the fitness of the place for an encampment, and the guard will go down on the 22nd inst.

Having secured bonds in the sum of \$2,000, Sidney Lashley was released from the county jail yesterday afternoon. The young man, with his father and others, is charged with fraudulent use of the mails in connection with the Lashley Coal Mining company. He will be tried in the Federal court at St. Louis in September next.

A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Tintic Mining company of Eureka, has been filed in the secretary of state's office. The objects of the corporation are to publish the Tintic Miner and conduct a general job printing business, and the capital stock is \$12,500. The incorporators are G. M. Whitmore, C. G. Wilson, C. J. Field, B. N. C. Stott and F. J. Fennell.

Dr. H. M. Rowe returned last evening from Green River, where he has been investigating for the state board of health, the recent excessive mortality among cattle. He found that loco weed and alkali water were the cause. Only cattle recently brought into the country eat the weed, other cattle avoiding it, but horses will eat it freely and "get drunk" on it, recovering from the effects afterwards. Cattle, however, bloat up, have lockjaw and die.

Word has been received from Prof. William Amadoc, the noted Welsh musician of Chicago, that he will arrive in Ogden on Tuesday, enroute to Madrid, Idaho, where he appears on Aug. 19. Prof. Amadoc comes directly from Columbia Junction, Iowa, where he has been conducting the musical features of the Chautauqua. A number of his Salt Lake friends may accompany him to Idaho and may arrange for his appearance in this city if possible for him to stop here on his return.

On Tuesday evening last the presidency of the Salt Lake stake and the bishopric of the Fourteenth ward met with the Elders of that ward at the ward meetinghouse and organized the "Eighty-ninth of Elders" with John M. Murray as president, John W. Spill and J. Frank Pickering as counselors, Feramorz Y. Fox as secretary and George Harris Taylor as assistant secretary. The quorum is 84 members, all residing within the Fourteenth ward. Meetings will be held the second and last Monday night of each month.

Complaint has been issued in the county attorney's office against Mark Jeffs, charging him with criminal relations with a 17-year-old girl named Ada Gertrude Marvin. The noted Mormon girl, Mrs. Sarah Marvin, who has been jailbird at the city and county building for nine years, swore to the complaint. She says that Jeffs promised to marry the girl and they went on to Farmington last Tuesday to get married, but Jeffs refused to keep his part of the agreement. Mrs. Marvin says she will have to marry the girl or go to jail.

TOO STRONG AND SHUFFLED OFF

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Harvey K. Glidden, Unnerved by Dissipation, Ends His Life in This Manner.

LATE HUSBAND OF MRS. ADAMS

Act of Self-Destruction Committed in The Turkish Bath Department of Sanitarium.

Harvey K. Glidden, divorced husband of Mrs. Asenath Adams Kiskadee, mother of Maude Adams, committed suicide by taking strychnine yesterday afternoon in the Turkish bath department of the Sanitarium. He drank probably a quarter of an ounce of the drug and his rash act was due, it is supposed, to a nervous collapse following a long spree.

Glidden of late years has been a rancher at Jackson's Hole, Wyo. A month ago he came to Salt Lake and started upon a career of dissipation. Last Tuesday, upon the advice of friends, he went to the Sanitarium to take the hot baths and try to get his nerves in order. He was very weak at the time. The rubber, Clarence Shoemaker, delivered a message to Glidden yesterday at about 2 o'clock and then sent to launch. A short while afterwards, Glidden appeared at the door of the Turkish department and called out: "I have taken strychnine, give me some water." Ray Wiley, an attendant, carried the suicide to a couch and called Dr. Dean, but Glidden had been through convulsions and was dead before the doctor could be summoned. The body was removed to Evans' undertaking parlors.

A search of the room in which Glidden committed his act failed to reveal any box or wrapper that might contain the poison. The attendants did not know that Glidden had been using it for his nerves, if indeed he had, nor were they aware of the true fact that Glidden was addicted to the use of the drug. He had concealed the strychnine in his pockets before going to the Sanitarium, as he stated before he died. When asked what he had done, he replied: "I have taken strychnine." He was taken to the baths, he was afraid he would die and he had the attendant send for his attorney. Prof. Lewis, managing the contest and vouchers for the genuineness of the affair.
