The Saviour tried to show them what true freedom is, and thus to demonstrate to them their servitude to sin. Satan has claims on men in proportion as they have had religion and dealings with him; men are not free while in debt, and terribly true is it when their creditor is such a one. The crowd misunderstood the lofty teachings of Jesus and fell to wrangling about the words. These divine truths were received with scorn by the people who called themselves descendants of Abraham and children of God. They professed the greatest horror at the quiet though unmistakable claims of Jesus to be one with the Father, and by question and contradiction they led up to the great declaration "Before Abraham was I Am." This was the climax of the scene; the Galilean claimed to be the Eternal One who had sent Moses into Egypt with the commission attested by that name. The people tried to take the life of Jesus then, but he contending he is remembered—His hour had not yet come.
