Kent sang two sacred solos, "My Faith In Tree," and "Courage," which were appreciated by all present. The session was well attended and the lecture was by Dr. James E. Talmage. The address was in the nature of a commentary on the solemn declaration of Jesus, as delivered to the unbelievers in the temple courts—"The Truth shall make you free." This promise, though seemingly one full of blessing and fragrant with the incense of liberty and harpiness served but to en-

and fragrant with the incense of lib-erty and happiness, served but to en-rage the Jews. They boasted both proudly and loudly of their descent from Abraham, and challenged the im-putation that they were or ever had been in need of emancipation, for as free-men born they had ever been free. The Savior tried to show them what true freedom is and thus to demon-strate to them their servitude to sin. Satan has claims on men in proportion

Satan has claims on men in proportion as they have had relation and dealings with him; men are not free while in debt, and terribly true is this when their creditor is such a one. The man who owes the bevil has a worse than Shylock with whom to treat—and the debt will not be canceled by any techdebt will not be canceled by any technicality of form.
