A PIONEER GONE.

Charles M. Evans, who died in this city Sept. 27, was a leading member of Capt. Ballou's famous band, which did service in early days. Born in Liverpooi, England, Jan. 27, 1831, the son of David and Sarah Menshall Evans, he David and Sarah Menshall Evans, he came to America in the winter of 1849-50 and resided in St. Louis for a short time and then joined the Latter-day Baints at Council Bluffs. He crossed the plains in 1852 with his brother, D. M. Evans, and family in the thirteenth company, commanded by Capt. Wil-liam Morgan, arriving in Sait Lake City in September of that year and settling in the Seventh ward, where he lived till 1832, when he moved to the Eleventh ward. He was a member of Lot Smith's ward. He was a member of Lot Smith's command, who protected the mail rout in 1862, acting as bugler, was assistant postmaster under T. B. H. Stenhouse, and was for many years the private secretary of Capt. Hooper. The funeral was held at his late residence, 1044 east Second South street, officiated over by Elders Charles Livingston and saac Sears. The speakers were Bishop Thorne, President Joseph E. Taylor and President Seymour B. Young.
