BACK DRAFT DISASTER.

One Man Killed, Four More or Less Seriously Injured.

New York, Dec. 3 .- One man was illed, another seriously injured and killed, another scribusly injured and three firemen were overcome by back-drafts in a fire which caused a loss of \$45,009 to a building in Bleeker street early today. All the lojured are fire-men. The man most seriously hurt is First Licut, Wakeley, who fed down a flight of states while groping his way through the smoke filled building. The firemen who were overcome by backthrough the smoke filled building. The firemen who were overcome by back-draft were attended by ambulance sur-geons in the street and were able to return to work. The dead man was identified as Horman Steigerts an em-ploye of a bakery on the ground floor of the building. The upper floors were oc-cupied by clothing munufacturers. Mrs. Steigert and her 18 months' old child were found sick in bed. Both had been if a long time. Mrs. Steigert said she had implored her hashand not to go to work last night, as she feit that something was about to happen. He laughed away her fears and told her he could not afford to lose a night's work, as he was depending upon this weak's wages to pay the rent of their tensment, which already was overdue.

TWENTY-FIVE NAOMI MINE VICTIMS FOUND

Pittshurg, Dec.3.—Twenty-five of the miner's caught by an exploation of five damp, early Sunday night, in the Nao-mi raine of the Union Coal company, located near Fayette City, 25 milus south of this city, had been reached by the rescuers at 4 o'clock this morning. All were dead and their bodies were burned and chared almost beyond rec-condition.

The rescuers are now nearing the end of the workings and they have found no sign of life anywhere, in the opinion of the owners of the mine, few if any more victims will be found, but among miners and others in the village there is a firm belief that the total number of victims is between 40 and

BURNS WAS HISSED, New York, Dec. 2.—Although giving him all the credit for beating "Gunner" Mole, in the heavyweight battle in London last night, the English press is not well pleased with the victory won by Tommy Burns, according to the extracts from the English pners ca-bled here early this maraing. The English believe Burns to be an Amor-ican, while as a matter of fact he is a Canadian, and it is evident that much of his unpopularity is due to that fact. Burns attempted to make a speech when he entered the ring at the Na-tional Sporting club for the nurpose of explaining his hationality, but he was hissed down. Even his victory after the fight which all admit was his from the third round, was heated. That Burns had all the best of the fight from the beginning is admitted by The Sportsman, which says that work was badly used up while "Burns or the other bad bad net turned a
