Analysis of Mineral Found in Mohawk Mine and Called Mohawkite.

The mineral thus purified was analyzed with the following results: Copper, 68.60: arsenic, 22.67; cobalt, 1.20; fron, 0.23; sulphur, 0.53; loss and undetermined, 0.22; total, 100.

In a letter to Mr. Stanton regarding the new mineral Dr. Ledoux says: A mineral of the above composition is new so far as we can learn, and in this we are confirmed by Professor J. F. Kemp, of Columbia University, the distinguished geologist. 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
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
