Ex-President Perkins of Burlington Makes an Announcement.

Boston, April 18 .- The first authoritative announcement concerning the ne-gotiations for the purchase of the Chiago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad company by the Northern Pacific and Great Northern Railroad companies, was given out tonight from the office of the Boston News Bureau in the form of a statement from Director and ex-President Charles E. Perkins, of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, as follows: 'Mr. Perkins says it was practically settled this afternoon that a formal of. fer of \$200 per share will be made in the course of a week or two, payable in the joint 4 per cent bonds of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific the companies, secured by a deposit of Chicago, Burlington & Quincy stock in trust, and that J. P. Morgan & Co., in behalf of a syndicate, will offer to buy \$50,000,000 of the bonds at par. Mr. Perkins says that personally he is in favor of accepting the proposition."
