County Clerk's Statement Shows Indebtedness of \$160,854.18; Various Assets, \$186,800.11.

NAME WATER COMMISSIONERS

State Senator Bamberger Asks for Franchise for Salt Lake and Ogden Rallway,

Ogden, July 24.-The county commissloners at their regular meeting received delegations representing the Wilson, Warren, Hooper, Plain City, Marriotte Harrisville, North Ogden and Farr West irrigation companies, who appeared to urge the appointment of water commissioners to look after the distribution of the waters of the Ogden and Weber rivers to the various Irrigationists throughout Weber county.

At the meeting of the board a week aga the petition of some of the compans for water commissioners was tabled, but it was evident that some difficulnes were going to arise of someone was not appointed to distribute the anters, hence the irrigation companies appointed their delegates who thorough-ly discussed the situation before the hoard and convinced them of the need or the appointments, which were made, Frank W. Stratford was appointed water commissioner for the Weber river and Joseph A. Taylor for the Ogden river. After these gentlemen have distributed the water to the various canal companies, everybody residing in the district must abide by the same and no way interfere with the headgates, otherwise they will be punished to the fullest extent of the law.
