

## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**ARRIVED.**—President Young and party arrived from the South at two o'clock this afternoon. He was escorted into the city by a large mounted body guard.

**THEATRE.**—"Richard Daryl" is a drama of exciting and interesting situations and will be played with a powerful cast to-night. **BOY DROWNED.**—We are informed, by a letter from Bro. T. Jacobs, of the accidental drowning of a child, sixteen months old, at Bountiful, on the afternoon of the 22d instant. The child was the son of David and Susanah Packrell. The little fellow had gone, unnoticed, to spring close to the dwelling house, and when found was floating on the surface of the water, life being extinct.

Our informant concludes by saying: "This should be a lasting warning to those who have wells or springs near their houses, unenclosed and accessible to small children."

**RAILROAD ACCIDENT.**—An Eastern bound train on the C. P. R. R., met with an accident the night before last on the Humboldt divide. Four cars loaded with freight ran off the track and were completely demolished. No person is injured. The track is all right again now.

**MORE ABOUT THE PROVO OUTRAGE.**—The following was received last evening, per Deseret Telegraph line, but was too late for publication in yesterday's News: Provo, Sept. 23, 3 p.m.

There was no apparent cause for the outrage, except that some soldiers had a party at the Buchanan house, kept by J. W. Cunningham, where they got whiskey and beer, and then made a raid through the town. They were quelled by the assembling of a number of the citizens and the firing of a few shots; after which they made for camp.

**IMPRISONED.**—Two soldiers, one of them dressed in citizen's clothes, evidently deserters from Fort Rawlins, were arrested last night for boasting that they were engaged in the Provo riot. One gave his name as Richard Patterson and the other John Brown. Their stories are so disconnected and conflicting that no dependence can be placed upon them. They will be turned over to the military authorities at Camp Douglas as deserters.

**A COOL ROBBERY.**—A cool robbery was lately perpetrated on the premises of Mr. and Mrs. Crane, an aged couple living on the Carson River, near Gold Hill, Nevada. Two robbers appeared at the house of the above, a few evenings since, about dusk, and bound the inmates. They then thoroughly searched the place, until they discovered and made off with the entire savings of the old people. At last accounts the robbers had not been discovered. So says the G. H. News.

**GAS COMPANY.**—Denver has a Gas Company which purposes having gas burning in that city by the middle of December.

**RED CLOUD.**—Cheyenne papers state that Red Cloud is at Fort Laramie, and that eight or ten car loads of presents had been shipped to that point for him and his "constituents."

## PARIS SOLDIERS MUTINIOUS!

Nearly 200 Women Burned to Death in a Theatre!

Boston 23.—Two old blind men, named McCormick were burned to death in their lodgings, in South St., last night; both were hard drinkers. The fire is supposed to have been kindled by lighting their pipes.

Oregon Items.

San Francisco 23.—The Oregon Senate refused to pass the House resolution, inviting Gen. Sherman and staff to the capital, alleging that the military service owes no obligations to the civil service.

## FOREIGN NEWS.

## SPAIN.

Excitement about the vomito.

Madrid, 23.—Intense excitement exists at Barcelona and other cities on the Mediterranean coast, regarding the vomito; the disease is of a violent type and spreading rapidly. More than a thousand cases are reported in Barcelona; about 400 have resulted fatally. Seventy thousand people have fled from the city, and business is prostrated. The disease was brought from Cuba in a steamer.

## GREAT BRITAIN.

French repulsed—War imminent between Russia and Turkey—Dreadful casualty in Strasbourg—Mutinuous.

The following dispatches have just been received here: The Prussian guns at Sceaux now command the southern part of Paris. The Prussians avoided St. Dennis, near the northern boundary, as much time would be lost in carrying it.

A railroad has been finished around the Paris forts. Arrangements have been made at Lille, whereby the complete inundation of the surrounding country can be effected in twelve hours. The means of defense will be resorted to on the approach of the Prussians.

A large amount of grain, collected around Paris, was recently burned to prevent it falling into the hands of the Prussians. They have occupied Dourden, a town eighteen miles south-west of Versailles. No Prussians are reported anywhere in the department of Aube.

Thiers, before leaving for Vienna, passed a night with Prince Metternich, the Austrian minister to France.

The road from Paris to Orleans is gorged with all sorts of vehicles, mainly loaded with effects from Paris.

The siege of Metz has become a mere blockade. The safety of Tours is threatened, as the uhlans are at Orleans and Blois.

A Berlin telegram, which is to be received cautiously, has the following startling intelligence: Russia is in motion to seize the Black Sea, and probably the Dardanelles; a war between the Czar and Sultan is imminent.

Couriers just in from the vicinity of Paris report a very severe battle yesterday, at a point immediately south of the city. The French forces in heavy columns, attacked the Prussians posted in the woods; and the former were repulsed with great loss.

The announcement that Senator Morton is to be sent to England to replace Motley, is regarded unfavorably, the present conjuncture requires a man at the head of our legation, of thorough experience in European affairs, and of diplomatic training.

Reports from Fenieres, France via Berlin, say that all discipline is vanishing at Paris; the soldiers are mutinous and in some cases shoot their officers.

Telegrams are posted in the news rooms here, reporting that the theatre of Strasbourg has been set on fire by a shell, and that two hundred persons who had taken refuge in the building, the majority of them women, were burned to death; also that private houses in the city had been broken into and plundered by the mob. The reports are not confirmed from other sources.
