"CHARLEY" AUER DEAD.

Highly Respected Citizen Gees the Way of All Flesh.

At 9 o'clock last night Charles Auer dled at his rooms in the Morian block He had been ill about 10 days with

pneumonia, complicated with heart trouble and pleurisy, and while his end was looked for by those nearest to him, the news of his death has caused a pro-found shock among the hundreds who knew "Charley Auer" as a large souled. good-hearted man, and constant friend "Charley" was perhaps known more "Charley" was perhaps known in our of widely than any surviving character of widely than any surviving character of the interests ran to early western life. His interests ran to art, of which in a quiet way he was a patron, and many a charitable enter-prise has found him a heavy donor, ai-though always an unobtrusive one.

There was found him a heavy doubt, at-though always an unobtrusive one. There were present last night, when he died, Dr. A. C. Young, his attending physician, and John J. McPhee, clerk of the deceased. Dr. Young had been in constant attendance ever since Mr. Auer had been stricken, but in view of the complications that set in he found medical aid to be of no avail. Mr. Auer was 65 years of age. He had never been married, but has rela-tives living in San Francisco, who yes-terday were notified of his serious Ill-ness. H. J. Winegar, a nephew, is ex-pected to arrive within a few days from San Francisco, to take charge of the remains, and funeral arrangements have been postponed pending his ar-rival.

rival. The career of Charles Auer was dis-tinctively bound up with the pioneer life of the west. He came to Sait Lake in 1871 from San Francisco, and his early friends were the overland pathearly friends were the overland path-finders, forty-niners, and the prospec-tors from the deserts. In Salt Lake he first engaged in the bakery business, but in the second year of his residence he opened the Occidental saloon on East First South street, in partnership with Edward Murphy, the firm existing with-out a break until the death of Mf. Mur-phy in 1884. He managed the Occiden-tal alone after 1884 until 1893, when the place was bought by his former part-ner's wife. Mrs. D. Gurnsey. A local undertaker who has done business in Greenwood cemetery, Brooklyn, says that the regulations under which that abode of the dead is conducted are of a strictness likely to surducted are of a strictness likely to sur-prise westerners. No one is allowed to enter the grounds with a boquet of flowers or a boquet in their button holes except with the understanding that these will be taken away by the officers if the parties return with them. This is to stop flower stealing from the graves, which in times past became a grievous nuisance. Then all parties carrying um-brelias are compelled to oven them on brellas are compelled to open them on leaving the cemetery, to make sure that no flowers are hidden therein. Mounted officers constantly patrol the grounds watching for vandals and disturbers of the peace.
