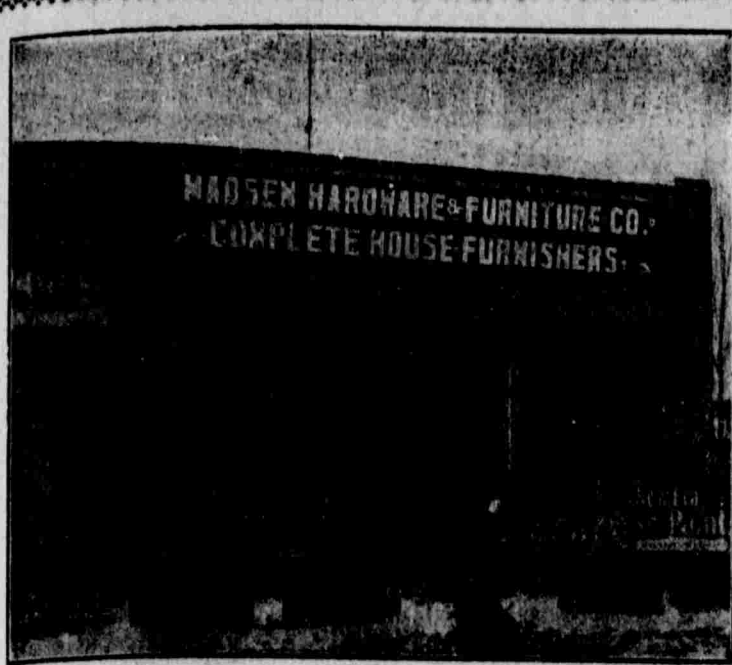

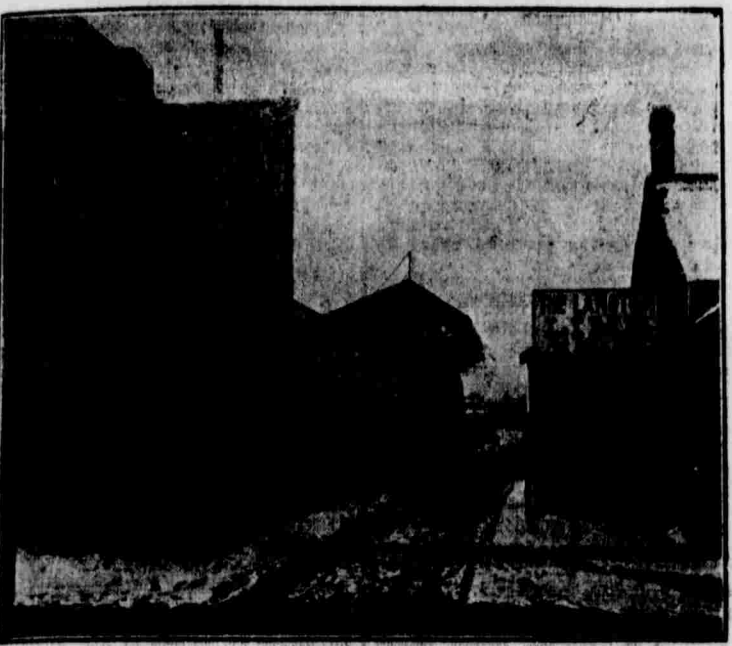

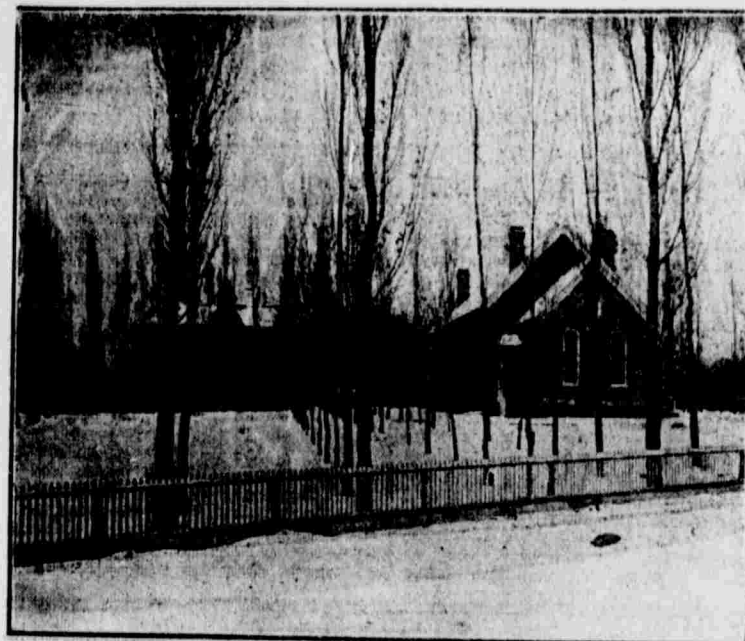


BRIGHTON STAGE LINE.

This resort is reached by taking a car to Murray, thence by stage which makes the round trip daily, leaving the Midway Livery and Feed Stables, run by Granter & Davis, at 8 o'clock a. m., and leaving Resort in time to catch the car to Salt Lake City at 8 p. m. Holliday, A Garden Spot in Salt Lake Valley

SIX miles to the southeast of Salt Lake City, and two miles to the east of the city of Murray, at the base of the Wasatch mountains, away from the fumes of the smelters and the smoke of the city, lies the lovely little village of Holliday. Its beauty is not surpassed in all of Salt Lake valley. The somewhat undulating country with its various elevations and many stately trees adds greatly to the scene. No matter from which direction the village is approached the presentation of the view

To the people of Salt Lake county there is no need of description, as thousands resort to this locality every season for their summer outings and vacations, and many more thousands pass through to the canyons of the Cottonwoods, and up to the famous resort, Brighton, which is operated by Hyrum Neilson of Holliday. The high altitude, the pure cool atmosphere, together with the productivity of the soil for almost every variety of fruit; the close proximity of the mountains and mountain streams have induced men of means to purchase summer homes in this berg. As a result of this real estate has advanced largely in value during the last two or three years. The locality furnishes an excellent opportunity for hunting and fishing on

and vegetables. Especially do they lead in berries and peaches. Strawberries to the value of from \$20 to \$40 per acre is not an uncommon yield. There is no more ideal locality in the state for a fruit cannery than in Holliday. Business men are investigating the feasibility of such an enterprise, and will no doubt find the conditions all that can be desired.

The business outlook is encouraging. This active little town supports five general merchandising stores that do an extensive business. The leading store here, owned and operated by Hyrum Neilson, does a business of upwards of \$60,000 per annum, with the others falling somewhat in the rear. The two butcher shops are also active—the Holliday market and the Bagley market. Bagley Bros. have a wide field of business both in wholesale and retail trade. Other avenues of trade are opened in the way of blacksmiths, barbers, etc., etc.

Educationally the town is well to the front. There are two good substantial brick schoolhouses, in the one of which there are six classrooms and in the other four. A person must visit this locality in order to appreciate its many advantages, and attractions, and by so doing the verdict will be that there are but few such favored spots in the west.

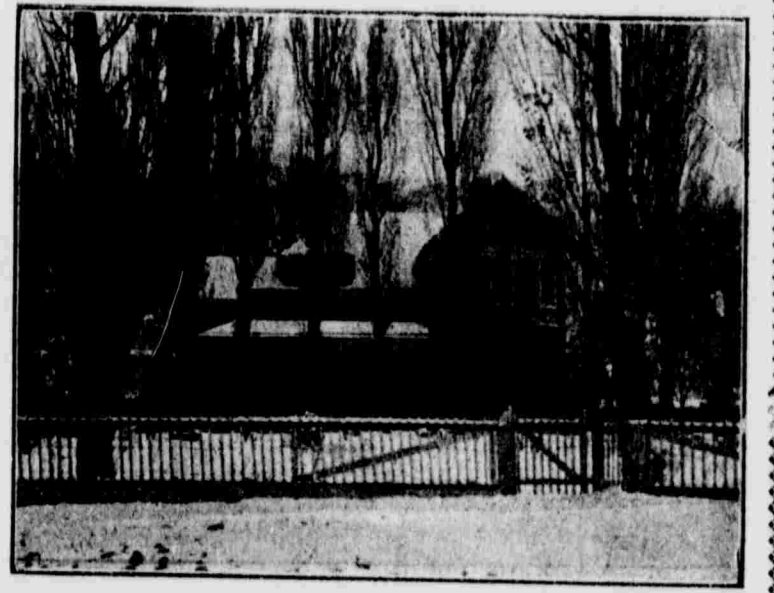


RESIDENCE OF DAVID B. BRINTON, HOLLIDAY.

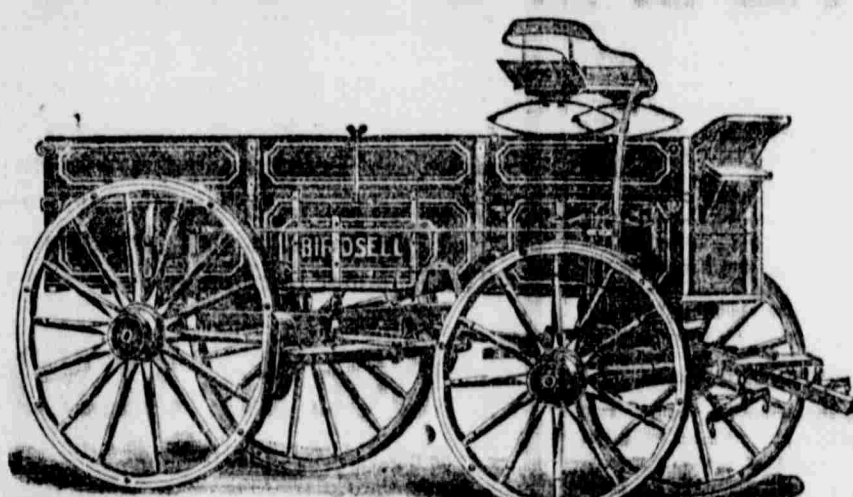

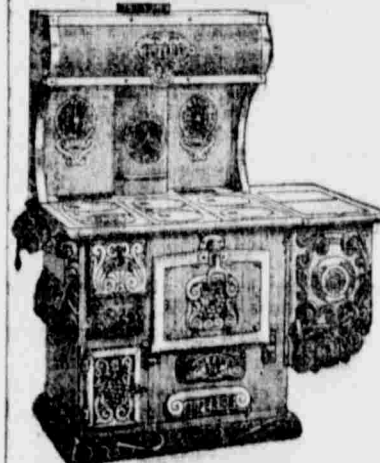
