THE DIPPER RESUMES.

William Evans Will Drive for the Contact Ledge on the 100 Level.

Pursuant to the decision of the directors of the Dipper Gold Mining company last week William Evans left for the property today to resume opera. Nothing has been done since Measrs, Lawrence and Dinwoodey sur-rendered their lease last summer, Mr. Evans is very confident that a big mine will be opened up in the district, as some fabulous gold values have been obtained on the ground which lies at the mouth of Little Cottonwood canyon, It has mouth of Lattle Cottonwood canyon, about 15 miles from the city. It has been opened up by a double compart-ment shaft 100 feet deep, from the bot-tom of which a drift has been run 77 feet east. Two stringers of gold ore were encountered in that distance, and it is now Mr. Evans' intention to fol-It is now all, brand in a south-low one of these stringers in a south-easterly direction to a point where he will tap the big contact ledge at a depth of 175 feet. The Dipper gives much promise of developing into a bonanza, judging by the high assays which have been secured at different times. Samples of rock were seen yesterday which were quite freely impregnated with free gold. Over \$800 worth of ore has been shipped from the property and sold on controls showing from 6 to 8 ounces per

AT THE HIGHLAND BOY.

The Mine Will Begin to Send Out Over 400 Tons Tomorrow.

Mr. George K. Fischer, superintendent of construction of the Highland Boy emelter, went out to Bingham today to witness the finishing touches which are being put on the Highland Boy tram. With the terminals completed the mine management expects to begin a new era tomorrow by turning out from 400 to 500 tons of ore daily. Every thing is now in readiness at the smelter for the increased ore supply and in-stead of sending east from eight to nine cars of copper bullion per month the smelter will turn out in the future between fifteen and eighteen cars. The output for the year will run close to 11.-000,000 pounds of copper-gold bullion. In addition to carrying the ore two and one-half miles from the mine to the railway the tramway will convey the coal to the mouth of tunnel No. 7, at which point the ore bins, coal bins com-pressor and steam engine are located. The starting up of the new smelter ad-dition means a great deal to Bingham as it will advertise its vast resources in a very forcible way. in a very forcible way.
