NEW LIQUOR LAW IN LOWER HOUSE

Movement in Favor of State Dispensaries Takes Definite Form in Lengthy Bill.

COMMITTEE ITS SPONSOR.

Section Six gives Cities the Right to Vote on Preference for Saloons or State Beer Shops.

PETITIONS FOR ELECTIONS.

Sec. 6 provides for the calling of elections in any city and town upon a petition of one-third of the registered voters therein on the following three questions:

"1. Whether intoxicating liquors shall be manufactured in said city or town, and whether the same shall be sold or otherwise disposed of for gain any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or intoxicating liquors, except as hereinafter provided, in any incorporated city or town without first obtaining a license from the board of aldermen or city councilmen, or the governing authorities, by whatever name called, of said city or town."

TWO NEW ONES

On motion of Darius, the rules were suspended and two new bills were added to the calendar, as follows:

H. B. 272, by Darius, making an appropriation for the improvement of existing roads and bridges leading from Emery county to Sanpete county. Committee on appropriations.

H. B. 273, by committee on municipal corporations, to regulate the manufacture and sale of liquor in the State of Utah. Referred to the same committee.

The vote by which S. B. 75 had been passed the day before was on motion of Marks, reconsidered and the measure was taken up again, amended and then passed by a vote of 38 yeas, 2 nays, 5 absent and not voting. The measure relates to the wrongful stamping of gold and silver articles.

SIX MEASURES PASS.

The house then passed the following bills:

H. B. 58, by Hollingsworth, relating to the form of summons in civil actions. Several grammatical errors were corrected in this bill, after which it passed by a vote of 38 yeas, 1 nay, 6 absent and not voting.

S. B. 109, by senate committee on irrigation. This measure is a substitute for Jackson's H. B. 14, which appropriated \$15,000 for experiments in boring for subterranean waters on dry farms. The senate substitute cut the amount down to \$2,000. Jackson declared this action would do away with the purpose of the bill. The house raised that amount to \$5,000 and passed the substitute by a vote of 39 yeas, absent and not voting six.

SPECIAL ORDER BILLS.

H. B. 41, substitute bill, relating to division of counties, was made the special order for Monday at 2 p. m.

H. B. 93, by Hone, requiring all corporations to pay an annual state license, was made the special order for Monday at 3 p. m.

The house then adjourned until 1 p. m. Saturday.
