BRYAN GIVEN **GREAT RECEPTION**

At Denver Talks on Republican Policies, Which Are Void And Without Form.

HE SAID, LET THERE BE LIGHT

Public Demands it on Tariff and Other Questions-His Hands Sore From Greeting Friends.

Denver, Oct. 16 .- William J. Bryan, Democratic candidate for president, was the guest of this city for several hours tonight and was given a most cordial reception. In spite of a threatening storm, accompanied by rainfall, great crowds lined the streets through which the candidate rode to the auditorium, where he delivered the principal speech of the program of speech-making outlined by him. All along the line of march he was received with enthusiastic acclaim. More than two-

The of marching clubs, from all sec-thusiastic acclaim. More than two-score of marching clubs, from all sec-tions of the state, followed the can-didate through the city's streets, and as he progressed the glow of red fire and other pyrotechnics added to the brilliancy of the electrical effects espe-cially arranged for the occasion. In route Mr. Bryan halted thrice to address the crowds stationed at points along the line of march, where it had been arranged that he should stop and briefly speak to overflow meetings. It required three-quarters of an hour to reach the auditorium, in which were assembled 14,000 people. As many more were compeled to content themselves outside as he passed through the en-tranceway. tranceway.

One of the features of the parade was an effigy of an elephant, representing the Republican party, lying dead from the shafts of Democratic assault, each spear being labeled with a Demo-

each spear being labeled with a Demo-cratic argument, such as "Antipubli-city," "Ananias club," "Tariff revision" and other suggestive inscriptions. Mr. Bryan had arranged to roturn to Omaha via the Union Pacific, but at the jast moment this arrangement was cancelled and he boarded a Burlington train immediately after the auditorium meting.

Mr. Bryan took for his text, "Let There be Light," and said, in part: "The Republican policies are with-out form and void. Darkness conceals their plans. The awakened conscience of an aroused people calls out. 'Let there be light.'

MIND TREATMENT. Cornell University Establishes Clinic

For Psycho-Therapeutics. New York, Oct. 17.-Those whose minds, rather than their bodies, need treatment are being received these days at the Cornell university medical colat the Cornell university medical col-lege in the first clinic for psycho-thera-peutics ever established in this city in connection with a professional school. The clinic is modeled on the one which has been conducted for the last two years in the Johns Hopkins university in Baltimore. It is in charge of Dr. Leslie Meacham and Dr. Beatrice M. Hinkle, who have for years made a study of nervous diseases. On Thursdays from 10 to 15 patients are being treated and the results at-

are being treated and the results at-tained in some cases have been excel-lent. The patients are selected and on-ly those are retained whose treatment by this method is especially indicated. The history of each case is carefully taken and studied. Hypnotism is used in some instances, and the whole meth-od of treatment is based upon the ability of the physician to reach the subjec-tive mind of the person to whom he ministers. whatever the professional equivalent for that lugubrious condition may be, are cheered by comforting words and soothing accents and told to keep up their courage. Often they are put to sleep while these inspiring suggestions are given to them.
