

PRESIDENT TAFT IS AN EARLY BIRD

Was Up at Five O'Clock Ready
To Make the Ride from Wa-
wona to Mariposa Grove.

JOHN MUIR WAS HIS GUIDE.

Today's Journey Will End at Glacier
Point—Will See Sun Rise Over
Yosemite Valley.

Wawona, Cal., Oct. 8.—President Taft was up at 5 o'clock this morning and an hour later had started by stage to see the giant sequoia trees of the Mariposa grove, eight miles from here. He spent nearly three hours in the grove, returned here for an early lunch and left this afternoon for Glacier Point, at the top of one of the great granite cliffs that wall in the Yosemite valley. The solemn dignity of the old trees which were living things long before the Christian era began, appealed strongly to Mr. Taft.

From Mr. John Muir, the naturalist, who accompanied him into the grove, Mr. Taft secured all the history of the giant, futed columns whose topmost branches seemed to pierce the sky. Scientists have estimated the age of the big trees as great as 5,000 years. Many of the sequoias seen by the president today bore evidence of having been scorched in some ancient forest fire.

When the president started out upon his second day of roughing it, he had 15 miles of stage riding before him. Yesterday's trip of 34 miles over the trail had acted as a real tonic, and Mr. Taft today was feeling quite equal to the five weeks of travel that separate him from the national capital.

The day's journey will end at Glacier Point, where the night will be spent. Early Saturday morning the president will see the sun rise over the Yosemite. He will then climb down a three mile trail to the floor of the canyon and will spend the day traveling to points of interest at the foot of the granite walls.

Saturday night will find the president again at the park entrance at El Portal, and Sunday morning he will board his special train and head for southern California.

The president is not adhering to the strict diet he started out to follow. The hospitable west has made it impossible. The result has been a material taking on of weight.

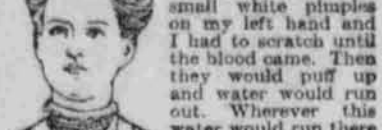

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ASQUITH PURSUED BY SUFFRAGETTES

Follow Him to Balmoral, Scot-
land, Where He Was Sum-
moned by the King.

CASTLE PRECINCTS GUARDED

Has Been Impossible to Arrange a
Compromise on the Budget
Controversy.

London, Oct. 8.—A delegation of suffragettes pursued Prime Minister Asquith to Balmoral, Scotland, where he was summoned by the king.

They are staying in a neighboring village and will not hesitate to invade the royal castle to persecute Mr. Asquith if chance offers. The castle precincts are closely guarded by detectives and the king's servants.

There was a big suffrage demonstration in Albert hall last night to bid farewell to Mrs. Pankhurst on her departure to America, and to protest against the compulsory feeding of arrested women who attempted to starve themselves at Birmingham.

Donations were invited to complete a proposed campaign fund of \$250,000, which would be used to send 100,000 copies of the "Suffragette" to the king.

The king thus far has been unsuccessful in arranging a compromise in the budget controversy. He is still trying, however, to prevent a crisis and today had another long consultation with Premier Asquith.

At times passes the difficulties in avoiding a conflict between the commons and the lords increase, the strong party men on both sides are eager for the fight.

On the other hand the Unionists, who have made all preparations for the election, are urging the leaders to do nothing that might prevent an immediate appeal to the people. They have seized upon Mr. Redmond's statement to America that the last obstacle to home rule would go with the disappearance of the veto of the house of lords, and are declaring that "a vote for the budget is a vote for home rule."

The house of lords is radically amending the Irish land bill. The lords threw out the clause providing for compulsory purchase, thus raising another issue between the two houses. The Nationalists have already announced that they will insist upon restoring the clause when the bill returns to the house of commons.

TURKEY GREAT FIELD FOR AMERICAN CAPITAL

New York, Oct. 8.—While American financiers will not be permitted to participate in the coming \$3,000,000 Turkish loan the visit of Zia Pasha, a special envoy from the new sultan to the Hudson-Fulton celebration, will result in the opening of a vast field in Turkey for American capital. At a banquet by bankers and railroad men in this city, Zia Pasha said that he would make it his personal business to see that American bids for railroads and electric equipment concessions in Turkey are favorably considered.

Under the new order of things in the Ottoman empire, he said, property rights are fully protected and foreign capital invested in the empire is entirely safe. Moreover, he said, American capitalists in seeking investment in Turkey would not be suspected of having any political ambitions lack of their investments, and that for this reason Americans are likely to be favored by the Turkish government.

MARRIED WOMEN.
Some in New York Decide It Is Not Necessary to Use Husband's Name.

New York, Oct. 8.—The New York Legislative League, composed of progressive women, has decided by resolution that it is not incumbent on a married woman to use her husband's name. While this resolution was unanimously carried, many prominent speakers declared that at the present time, with men in a more powerful political position, it would be expedient for women to use some part of their husband's names.

"My husband objected to me using my own name," declared Mrs. Margaret Holmes Bates, "and it did not do him any good. I wrote and signed my writings with my own name. It is all very well in private and social life to use your husband's name, if he is anybody. I don't see why anybody should use the name of a nobody."

"It depends upon the name," said Mrs. Lillie Devereaux Blake, from the chair. "I preferred my name because it is pretty."

WESTERN PACIFIC OPENS NOV. FIRST

H. M. McCartney, Former Salt
Laker, Sets Date for Com-
pletion of Road.

FOUR STEEL GANGS AT WORK

Offices for W. P. and D. & R. G. Be-
ing Opened in New Palace Hotel
At San Francisco.

(Special Correspondence.)
San Francisco, Oct. 2.—With pas-
senger offices being furnished for the
Western Pacific and Rio Grande in the
new Palace hotel, to be opened,
it is hoped, for Portola visitors, in-
dications that the line is to be opened
shortly become more and more evi-
dent.

H. M. McCartney, assistant engineer and an old Salt Laker, puts the date of completion just a month ahead, November 1st, weather permitting an uninterrupted continuation of work, of course. It is believed the first train to travel between Salt Lake and Oakland over the new line will make the trip somewhere near the first of the coming month.

"Mac," home from a ten-day vacation, is enthusiastic over progress of work. Four track-laying machines are at work, and with materials forthcoming as needed, four miles are laid a day. As there are only 48 miles of gaps remaining, it can be seen that the opening set for the first of November is not so doubtful.

SEVEN BRIDGES TO BUILD.
The 68 miles of untracked route is composed of a 21-mile stretch on the north fork of the Feather river, and a 47-mile stretch near the California-Nevada state line. The line has been completed east of Winnemucca. Seven bridges remain un-built.

With the constructing departments located here, it is impossible to get any definite information as to what appointments are to be made in organizing various departments to have charge of operation and traffic. The question is referred to New York—and so far no news has emanated from the far east, so curiosity grows as the rails close in upon the distance between terminals.

SALT LAKE TRANSFER.
From an up-stairs office, to ground floor quarters on Market street, this city's main thoroughfare, is the transfer being made by the Salt Lake Route's local passenger and freight representatives. The force's new offices are located just below The Chronicle building and across the street from the new Palace where the Western Pacific and Rio Grande will have offices.

"ESPEE" TO COMPETE.
"Commuters" of Alameda county (myself included) prefer the airy, light and comfortable electric trolley cars of the San Francisco, Oakland & San Jose (Horax Smith's Interurban system) to the hot, dusty, stuffy day coaches of the Southern Pacific's oil-power system. Alameda county comprises Oakland, Berkeley and other cities who have thousands of residents with business in San Francisco. The "commuter" movement to San Francisco every morning and back across the bay and inland again every evening is quite an item—such an item that the Southern Pacific has asked for bids on eighty-four cars of the electric trolley type. These will cost over a million and a half and will have a total carrying capacity of eight thousand passengers. The Espee

will then be in a position to match the service of its interurban competitor. Both systems operate a 20 minute car service connecting with ferryboats. The ferry traffic between the Oakland and San Francisco sides of the bay is smaller than none, with exception of the service into New York.
