

Utah and Nation Are Republican

Republicans Control the Legislature by an Overwhelming Majority and Elect Howell to Congress and McCarty to the Supreme Court—Pluralities Will Probably be Upwards of 3,000—Democratic County Tickets Lost.

Utah, like the nation, is in the Republican column. Howell is elected to Congress over King, and McCarty has defeated Young for the Supreme bench. The legislature is overwhelmingly Republican (probably more than three fourths), and Hon. Reed Smoot of Provo will doubtless be chosen to succeed Hon. Joseph L. Rawlins in the United States senate, his term of office to begin next March and to run for six years.

Returns are not complete, and in many cases the exact figures will not be forthcoming until the official canvass is completed, but enough have been received to make it quite clear that the Republican pluralities will range from 3,000 to 5,000 and probably more than that. The sweep is almost complete. Howell made a strong race and apparently leads his ticket. His popularity is even greater than his friends hoped for, though the result showed that Chairman Anderson's forecast of a majority of 3,500 was conservative and based upon correct information.

Catch county, nearly always Democratic, will send three Republican representatives to the Legislature and one Democratic senator. Wasatch also swung from the Democratic to the Republican column and will furnish a Republican representative for the Legislature. But Rich, which was calculated upon for a Republican, will send a Democrat, according to the latest returns. Utah county, the acknowledged battleground of the state, and the home of Mr. Smoot, contributes a full Republican delegation, while Weber county is Republican by a plurality running around 1,000.

DEMOCRATS OF SALT LAKE ELECT ONLY ONE MAN, SIMON BAMBERGER, TO THE STATE SENATE.

The Democrats of Salt Lake county have, like those of nearly all of the rest of the counties of the state, been woefully defeated. The terrific scratching that prevailed, and which they hoped would result in the election of their legislative ticket, was not sufficient to bring about a realization of their hopes. Only one Democrat in the county pulled through, and he was Simon Bamberger, elected to the State senate over Jacob Moritz, against whom a terrific fight was made by the temperance people on account of his brewery and saloon business. Mr. Moritz left during the afternoon for Honolulu and was notified by a friend last night that he had suffered an overwhelming defeat at the hands of his friend, Mr. Bamberger.

WEBER COUNTY VOTE.

What the Totals Are in the Second County of the State.

Ogden, Nov. 5.—With four precincts yet heard from and which, however, will not change the result, Weber county yesterday went Republican from a tie. The precincts yet to be heard from are Wilson, Uintah, Far West and Roy, and there will be no returns forthcoming until probably Monday, when the county commissioners will open the sealed ballots. THE VOTE IN PROVO.

Republicans Receive Good Majorities And Carry the County.

Provo, Nov. 5.—In Utah county the Republican legislative ticket won with good majorities, the vote in Provo being as follows:

For the State Senate—C. E. Lowe, 1,384; Henry E. Gardner, 1,400.

For the Lower House—J. C. Chipman, 1,434; John C. Stone, 1,397; George Austin, 1,350; Charles A. Tietjen, 1,380.

The Democratic candidates received the following votes: For the State Senate—Abel John Evans, 98; W. M. Roy, 98; For the Lower House—James H. Clark, 957; Royal A. Barney, 1,040; D. C. Johnson, 915; Justin A. Loveless, 915.

The vote for sheriff gives Harmon, Republican, 1,233, as against 1,117 for Stiers. Democratic indications are that the county will give Harmon a majority of 235, the highest received by any candidate. The Republican legislative ticket will doubtless have a majority of 350, and the county ticket a majority of from 600 to 700.

Republicans Carry Idaho.

Pocatello, Ida., Nov. 5.—Election returns show Bannock county safely Republican, John T. Morrison for governor, Burton C. French, for lieutenant, Jas. P. Allaire for justice of the supreme court. State senator, A. B. Stevenson, for state representative, Denmark Jensen and Jas. F. Hunt. Only two Democratic nominees are conceded, Ed. G. Gallet for county clerk and Mrs. Anna Harmer for superintendent of schools.

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LIVELY TIMES IN COLORADO.

Result of Election as to State Ticket in Doubt—Democrats Will Have Majority in Legislature—Republicans Will Contest Election and Organize a Rump Legislature.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 5.—The result of the election as to the state ticket was still in doubt at noon today. Nearly complete returns of Arapahoe county, including the city of Denver, give E. C. Stinson, the Democratic candidate for governor, a plurality of 4,000 over James H. Peabody, Republican. Milton Smith, chairman of the Democratic state committee, concedes a Republican plurality of about 2,500 in the state outside Arapahoe county, but says that Stinson's election is assured by the vote of this county. D. B. Fairly, chairman of the Republican state committee, still claims the election of the entire Republican state ticket by 3,000 to 10,000 plurality. There appears to be no doubt the Democrats will have a large majority on joint ballot in the legislature, insuring the re-election of United States Senator Teller. Careful estimates show that the house will consist of 29 Democrats, 34 Republicans and two members who were on both tickets and the senate of 25 Democrats, eight Republicans and two Populists. Both Republicans and Democrats are claiming the three congressmen to be elected favor the Democrats. Should Adams and Shaw be elected, declared their seats will probably be contested on the ground of alleged frauds in Denver. The Republicans allege that 5,000 fraudulent votes were cast in this county for the Democratic ticket.

All the constitutional amendments were adopted except the Bucklin Australian tax system. "A Times extra says: "The Republicans are preparing to contest the election of the Democratic legislative ticket in Arapahoe. They claim that the result of the election of the legislature depends upon the result of this county. They will ask the secretary of state to refuse certification to the Democrats, and if Mr. Mills, who is a Populist, refuses to enter into the scheme, they are planning to organize a rump legislature. They claim that Peabody, if elected, will issue credentials to the men chosen by the rump assembly. Edward O. Walcott is already informed of the situation and he will come to Denver at once to enter the same and make a fight for the Republican choice as against Teller."

Complete returns from 71 of the 236 precincts in this (Arapahoe) county give E. C. Stinson, the Democratic candidate for governor, a plurality of 4,000. The other Democratic candidates are running well up with Stinson. At noon Republican headquarters claim that James H. Peabody, the Republican candidate for governor, has been elected, and that he has pulled a portion of the Republican state ticket through with him. "The Republicans also claim the election of Brooks for congressman-at-large, and of Hogg, in the second district."

In the First district Shafroth is apparently elected, but his election in the district is still in doubt. Mr. Smith, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, claims the election of the Democratic state ticket by majorities ranging from 4,000 for Stinson to 8,000 for the remainder of the ticket and all the congressmen. "We will have a majority of 10 in the lower house of the legislature, and of course, a larger majority in the senate," said Mr. Smith.

Chairman Fairley of the Republican state committee, sent a telegram to the chairman of the Republican congressional committee claiming the election of two congressmen and the third to be secured on a contest showing fraud. "We will come to Arapahoe county with 10,000 plurality and will elect our entire ticket by 5,000," said Mr. Fairley. "We will have a majority of the representatives outside Arapahoe county."

Secy. Chamberlain, of the Arapahoe county Republican committee, said that the alleged frauds in this county would have to be investigated by the courts and the fraudulent votes thrown out. It is understood that action will be commenced in the county court before Judge Lindsey as soon as the attorneys of the committee can prepare the necessary papers.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Philadelphia, Nov. 5.—Incomplete returns indicate that the Pennsylvania delegation in the next Congress will stand:

Republicans 23, Democrats 4. George W. Howell, Democrat, defeated William Connell, Republican, in the Tenth district. Connell succeeded in keeping Howell out of the ballot, under the head of Anti-machine and Union party, and returns today indicate Connell's defeat. The district is now in the hands of the Democrats. The Democrats made a clean sweep of the county.

Twenty-sixth Pennsylvania District—Joseph H. Shull, Democrat, elected. Fifteenth—Elias Desmer, Republican, elected. Eighth—Irvin P. Wanger, Republican, elected. Twentieth—D. F. Leefer, Republican, elected. Twenty-third—Allen P. Cooper, Republican, elected.

Pittsburg, Nov. 5.—Later returns have placed the Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth second congressional districts in doubt. Republicanism in the Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth in the Thirty-second are claiming their election today over Shiras and Brown, Fusionists. It may require the complete returns to decide.

MISSOURI.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 5.—While complete returns from all parts of the state have not been received there is nothing to indicate that the Democrats will lose the majority in the legislature. The figures, which show the election of the Democratic state ticket, a safe Democratic majority in the legislature that will elect a successor to U. S. Senator G. W. Vest, and the election of 15 Democrats out of 16 congressmen.

Richard Barthol, who was re-elected to Congress from the Eleventh district, was the only successful Republican candidate. The Democratic majority in St. Louis on the state and city tickets, will be in the neighborhood of 7,000.

MONTANA.

Butte, Mont., Nov. 5.—At 3 a. m. 107 precincts in the state gave Dixon (Rep.) for Congress, 8,234; Evans (Dem.) 5,648. One hundred and eight precincts gave Dixon a majority of 2,586. The next day, 10,713; Lewis, 1,193. These figures include Anaconda complete, Missoula, Fergus nearly complete, portions of Lewis and Clarke and Silver Bow and Madison complete with the exception of Sheridan.

In Silver Bow the Fusionists, or Helms party elected practically their entire delegation. The next day, 10,713; Lewis, 1,193. The Democratic ticket is chiefly successful. The legislature will be Republican by a small majority.

Helena, Nov. 5.—Allowing the Democrats senators in three counties yet claimed by the Republican state central committee to be doubtful, the Republicans will have a majority in the legislature, and the Democrats, Labor and Fusion parties, 37. Later returns indicate a still more sweeping Republican victory than was anticipated. The Republican state ticket is elected, and Judge Holloway is elected associate justice by nearly 9,000 plurality and Jos. B. Dixon congressman by half that number.

TEXAS.

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 5.—The vote in Texas for state and congressional officers was lighter than in 1900. The Democrats swept the state, the ticket headed by S. W. T. Lammam, winning by a heavy majority. Latest returns show that the Democrats elected Congressmen from all 16 districts. The constitutional amendment requiring voters to pay poll tax was the principal point of interest. Indications are that it carried by a good majority.

NORTH DAKOTA.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 5.—North Dakota has gone Republican by about the usual majority. The Republican state committee estimate White's majority for governor as 8,000. North Dakota elects two congressmen at large this year, and both of these are Republicans. Marshall, being re-elected, and H. F. Spaulding being named as his associate. The legislature, which will elect a successor to U. S. Senator Hansbrough, is overwhelmingly Republican.

REJOICING IN COALVILLE.

Coalville, Nov. 5.—There was much rejoicing in Coalville this morning when

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of 21 Republicans and 9 Democrats, and a house of representatives of 155 Republicans, 82 Democrats and 3 Socialists.

The last vote was the largest ever thrown for governor, reaching approximately 350,000 against 385,100 for governor two years ago. Lieut. Gov. Hahn, in being chosen governor, led Col. Wm. A. Gaston, the Democratic candidate, by a plurality of 37,413, but Col. Gaston made a gain of 40 per cent in the party vote as compared with that given Josiah Quincy last year, and cut an average Republican plurality about one-half.

The Socialist vote cannot be overlooked, as John C. Chase, for governor, received about 34,000, a gain of more than 200 per cent over last year, and jumped the party from a 3 per cent to an 8 per cent basis.

CALIFORNIA.

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—Complete returns from 1,113 precincts out of 2,397, including San Francisco, give Pardee 59,826; Lane, 64,294. Same precincts gave McKinley, 74,182; Bryan, 55,396. The apparent showing of Lane is due to the fact that San Francisco, which for him a majority of over 9,000, 18 included.

For Congress in First district complete returns from 128 out of 550 precincts give Gillette (Rep.), 4,736; Ford (Dem.), 2,887. Same precincts gave McKinley, 5,058; Bryan, 4,418. For Congress, Third district, complete returns from 97 out of 234 precincts give Metcalf, 6,737; White, 3,308. Same precincts gave McKinley, 6,742; Bryan, 4,418.

For Congress in Seventh district complete returns from 135 out of 185 precincts give Metcalf, 6,737; White, 3,308. Same precincts gave McKinley, 6,742; Bryan, 4,418. For Congress, Eighth district, 156 precincts out of 429 give Combs (Rep.), 6,235; Bell (Dem.), 4,550. Same precincts gave McKinley, 7,388; Bryan, 6,161.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 5.—One hundred and seven out of 187 precincts gave Lane 6,355; Pardee 9,355; Lane, 6,355. Same gave McKinley 10,750; Bryan, 8,506. McLachlan for Congress ran ahead of the ticket and the majority over Johnston is estimated at 2,700. Daniels for Congress in Eighth district elected by apparently good majority, though figures not obtainable at this time.

Fourth District—E. J. Livernash, Democrat and Union Labor, elected.

IDAHOO.

Boise, Idaho, Nov. 5.—Returns on the Idaho election received this morning confirm figures sent out last night showing the election of the entire Republican ticket, and the Republican state majority on joint ballot in the legislature seems assured, and W. E. Borah will probably succeed Senator Heltzel in the United States senate. Democratic State Chairman Donnelly this morning conceded the election of the entire Republican ticket. The Republican ticket will have one less than a majority on joint ballot in the legislature. Republican leaders claim their majority will be 13.

IOWA.

Des Moines, Nov. 5.—The Democrats succeeded at yesterday's election in electing one congressman in Iowa for the first time in eight years, Judge Martin J. Wade defeating the Republican candidate, Hoffman, by 800 plurality. Birdsell, Republican, in Spaulding Henderson's district, received 5,600 plurality.

The Republican plurality for the state ticket will exceed 70,000.

WYOMING.

(Special to the "News.") Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 5.—Late returns add to the Republican majorities on congressional, state and legislative tickets in Wyoming, based on the results of the election of 1900. The Mondell for Congress will have a plurality of 7,500 or 8,000; Richards for governor, a plurality of 4,500 and the entire state ticket pluralities of from 1,500 to 2,500. The legislature will probably stand on joint ballot; Republicans, 67; Democrats, 6.

DELAWARE.

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 5.—The state senate will stand 18 Republicans and 7 Democrats. The house will stand 18 Republicans and 16 Democrats, with one district undecided by reason of a light vote. On joint ballot, the vote will be 23 Republicans, 23 Democrats, one tie. Of the Republican members, it is conceded that eight are opposed to the election of the United States senators at the next session of the legislature.

OHIO.

Columbus, O., Nov. 5.—The Republicans today say their plurality on the state ticket will be approximately 10,000. The Ohio congressmen stand 17 Republicans to four Democrats as in the last Congress. The plurality in all of the four Democratic districts is conceded to be small. The Ohio changes were in the Twelfth and Thirteenth districts, and they offset each other. The Democrats gained the former by electing Judge De Witt C. Badger of Cyrus Huling, (Dem.), 1,280. The vote of Dr. James A. Norton, who has been in Congress many years.

MARYLAND.

Baltimore, Nov. 5.—Though the count has not yet been officially declared it is known that the Republican majority in the state of Maryland is very near 5,500. Four Republicans and two Democratic representatives are elected, a gain of two for the Democrats.

WISCONSIN.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 5.—The latest returns show that La Follette has carried the state by at least 40,000 plurality and some estimates give him 45,000. The congressional delegation is complete is made up of 10 Republicans and 1 Democrat. The returns from legislative districts indicate an overwhelming majority for the Republicans, which means the probable re-election of United States Senator Spooner.
