ARGUMENT FOR DEFENSE They Can't be IN LAND FRAUD CASES. Made Purer.

Portland. Or. Dec. 5-The argument of counsel for the defense in the and fraud case began today. Lawrence Puter of Eureka, Cal. brother of one of the defendants, addressed the court and jury on behalf of the persons accused by the federal government of a cuspiracy to defraud the government of the lands.

The attorney held that the povernment

conspiracy to defraud the government or public lands.

The attorney held that the government has falled to make out its case against the prisoners and attacked the testimony of the government's principal witnesses, Montague and Heindecke, as unworthy of bellef. Counsel alleged that the principals in the defense were innocent purchasers of the lands and not responsible for deceptions practised upon them, and that the persons whom the government claims are fletitious are living human beings who actually went upon the lands in question.

Judge O'Day went before the jury this

Judge O'Day went before the jury this acroling to defend himself of certain assersions thrown upon him by witnesses or the government. He attacked the florts of the government to convict the efendants in sarcastic vetn.

He ridiculed its testimony and belittied he witnesses. His argument was oxiaustive in detail and covered the history of the case from its inception. When udge O'Day concluded, the court advanced until tomorrow. It will take anther day to finish the trial.

Special Prosecutor Henry will occupy he forenoon with argument, and possibly lup ever into the afternoon. Pollowing this will come the charge of the jury y Judge Bellinger. It is thought that he deliberations of the jury will be rief.

If the heated response of Special Assistant Attorney-General F. J. Hency to the counsel for the defense, made during a somewhat acrimonous celloquy, which occurred during the trial, may be taken to mean anything, these prosecutions will. If necessary to subserve the ends of justice, be followed to the doors of some of the highest officials in the country, before the government will cense its efforts to punish those by whom it believes it has been wronged.

Puzzling as was the plan of the prosecution's attack during the early days of the trial, and surprising as were the developments as the plan of the prosecution's attack during the early days of the trial, and surprising as were the developments as the plan slowly unfolded, nothing has been zich a source for wonderment in the minds of those who have followed the trial from day to day, as the course pursued by the defense.

At no time did the defense attempt to discredit the testimony of any of the witnesses for the prosecution by cross-questioning. The only instance during the entire trial where one of the witnesses for the government was at all vigorously cross-examined was when the defense attempt to impeach the evidence given by the witness Heldecke, who made statements reflecting on the professional integrity of one of the determinant's counsel offered not one witness of their own. They did, however, on one ground or another, except to every indictment, to every legal step and to every question propounded by the prosecution to its witnesses.

From this it would seem to be a fair deduction that the defense will, in its closing argument, allege that the pury he instructed to return a verdict of acquit-tal.


