Pure Food Law Responsible For Certified Milk.

EFORE the close of the year \$75,000 will be spent by the dairymen in B purifying the small river of milk-5,000 gallons a day-which is de-livered in Salt Lake City. As a result of the expenditure of this amount of money and the enforcement of the pure food laws, the quality of the milk has been so wonderfully improved, as well as the sanitary conditions, that "certified milk" will be placed on the market by the first of the year.

In the last six months the volume of business has been materially increased on account of the improved conditions. There are 98 dairies in Salt Lake county which conduct a retail business here, and 102 dairymen who ship milk each morning and night into Salt Laké within a radius of 100 miles. This is an increase of one-fifth in the number of dairies and the consumption of milk is increased accordingly.

Because the public prefers milk that is cheap to milk that is pure, an authority says, it has been difficult to educate the public mind to that point where it would ask, "How good is it?" instead of "How much does it cost?" But the dairymon have responded willingly to the provisions of the pure food laws and ordinances and as a result better milk supplied.

commissioner, is now making a tour of the dairies which supply Salt Lake with milk. Out of the 45 dairies visited the second time he found that 32 were scoring above 45 points, the govern-ment standard. The first score showed that the dairies were on an average in fair condition but nothing extra. Before a dealer can sell milk in Salt Lake he must secure a permit, his place inspected and scored and a strict com-pliance with the ordinance adhered to or his permit will be revoked. After the first of the year every dairy which supplies Salt Lake with milk will have to maintain a score of 50 or above. STANDARD REQUIRED.

STANDARD REQUIRED. The required standard is as follows

(c) Milk containing less than 32-10 per cent of fats.
(d) Milk drawn from animals within 20 days before or five days after parturition.
(e) Milk drawn from animals fed on distillery waste, or any substance in a state of fermentation or putrefaction, or any unwholesome food.
(f) Milk drawn from cows kept in a crowded or unhealthy condition.
(g) Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.
(h) Milk which has been dluted with wafer or any foreign substance whatever.

The required standard is as follows. "Milk and cream, as used in this ordi-nance, shall be deemed to be adulterat-ed in any of the following cases: (a) Milk containing more than 88 per (b) Milk containing less than 12 per
