WARNING HIM TO ABOLISH IT.—The Chicago *Post*, reviewing Crayton and Utah affairs, concludes that the new apportionment bill and other legislation will settle the "Mormon problem." Says the Post—

"The question of the admission of Utah will thus be postponed for at least ten years, and by that time Judge McLean will have had an opportunity of settling polygamy, either by the Territorial statute under which he is now acting, or by the further aid of some such law as Senator Crayton has contemplated."
