LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Thermometer 57 degrees F. in the shade, at 1 p.m. to-day. Cloudy.

Large Carrots.—Brother J. H. Picknell brought into our office this morning two White Belgian carrots, weighing nine pounds together. They were not raised in rich alluvial bottom land, but in gravelly bench soil at Butcherville. He has raised at the rate of 1,400 bushels to the acre, but he thinks his present crop of a few rods in the above mentioned locality will exceed that rate. White carrots are an excellent food feed for horses, sheep and horned stock.

That Street Railroad Extension.—Some time since we stated that it was intended by the Salt Lake Street Railroad Company to make an extension of their line from the Valley House corner eastward along South Temple Street to the 20th Ward Co-operative store corner, or the street beyond, thence northward a block or two and thence eastward again, in the direction of Butcherville. There is sufficient iron on hand for the track from the Valley House corner to the point where it will turn northward, and the work of making the grade for this extension was commenced this morning. It is expected that the line as far as the northward turning point will be in running order in a week or two. This extension of the street railroad will be a great convenience to people living in the north-eastern portion of the City.

Threatening to Kill.—Yesterday one Kelley, alias Foster, was arrested on a charge preferred against him by Mr. Brown of Brown & Mulloy, and for threatening to take his life. It appears that the difficulty was the result of an old grudge. Mr. Foster visited Mr. Brown at the latter's stables yesterday, where, as Mr. Brown testified, Foster threatened to kill him whenever he got a good opportunity. Mr. Brown had him arrested, and the chief of police liberated him till this morning, on security, after getting Mr. Foster to promise that he would not go near Mr. Brown in the meantime. Mr. Foster did go to the stables, however, last evening, in company with others, when Mr. Brown, believing that he had come for a quarrel, covered him with a double-barrelled shot-gun.

Both men have the appearance of being of that stamp that there is danger in their quarrels.

Mr. Foster was discharged by Justice Pyper, and immediately afterwards deputy marshal Brockway arrested Mr. Brown, on a charge of menacing and threatening Mr. Foster and others with a shot-gun.

Utah Southern Railroad to be Extended.—A short time since Bishop John Sharp, superintendent of the Utah Central Railroad, went east for the purpose of entering into negotiations for iron, with a view to extending the Utah Southern from Provo to Santaquin. A telegram received from him on Saturday evening states that he had been successful and would leave New York for home on Saturday night.

The iron was to be shipped directly, and the Company will shortly have a large number of hands at

work on the proposed extension, which will be an addition to the line of twenty-five miles or so.

A Creditable Establishment.—On Saturday we visited the foundry and machine shops of Messrs. Davis, Howe & Co., of this city, the most extensive works of the kind between Omaha and California. As before noticed in the News, the firm has lately increased its working capacity by the purchase of about \$7,000 worth of machinery, recently brought on from the East, and now all fitted and ready for running, and it was expected to-day to be put in operation. Among the late accessories is a forty-four inch by forty-two inch planing machine, with capacity to plane in twelve feet lengths; also a thirty-two inch swing engine lathe, which can turn lengths of twelve feet; then a twenty-six inch swing lathe, which turns a length of sixteen feet. This last mentioned piece is a most superior machine, having a shaft-turning attachment, being the only one of such completeness in the Territory. The planer and lathes were manufactured at Niles' Tool Works, Hamilton, Ohio, one of the best establishments in the line in America, their products being justly celebrated in every part of the Union. They carried off the premium at the late Cincinnati State Fair. At Davis, Howe & Co.'s we also noticed a splendid drilling and boring press, and an improved belt-cutting machine, the latter capacitated to turn out bolts from 1 of an inch to 1 1/2 inches. Besides these late importations of machinery the shafting, pulleys and general gearing are all new, the pulleys having been made at the works.

The machine-shop and blacksmith-shop have only just been erected, and have a frontage of 53 feet, and run back from the street about 80 feet. The compartment in the upper story, over the machine shop, is the pattern-makers' portion of the premises, the machinery of which is of home make, having been manufactured in the establishment.

The old building, which recently constituted the whole premises, but now the smaller part, will be used exclusively for the carrying on of the foundry work. The improvements are not yet confined to the machine department, but are also being extended to this branch. A new furnace is now in process of construction and the old one will be removed from its present location to a position along side of it, making a double furnace, from which castings can be produced all the way up to seven tons. In the foundry is a powerful crank, with a lifting capacity of fifteen tons.

We omitted to mention, in noticing the most interesting features of the machine department, one of Armstrong's heaters, filters, lime catchers and condensers combined, for which Davis, Howe & Co. are agents. Lack of time and space will not admit of our giving an elaborate description of this interesting piece of mechanism, further than to say that it effectually prevents incrustations forming in the interior of boilers, pipes, etc., from impure water.

At the works we noticed some of the lamp posts being produced there for Salt Lake City. They are supplied by the firm at nearly the same figures as those imported, and are at the same time considerably heavier, and at least equal in point of quality in any respect.

We have no hesitancy in saying that the works of Davis, Howe & Co. are not only a credit to the firm themselves, but a credit to the city and Territory, and we admit that the completeness of the establishment took us somewhat by surprise. We expect to see, at no distant day, the works in such a position that there will be turned out there the very kind of machinery above enumerated, which has been imported to increase the working capacity of the establishment.

Gentlemen who have thus far shown such commendable business energy are not the kind of persons to remain at a standstill, progress being evidently their business motto.

The above article was written on Saturday, but, owing to a press of other matter, was unavoidably crowded out.

Find Him.—Today, William Bowden went to the premises of Widow Birchmell, 8th Ward, entered the stable, examined the harness, went into the hay-loft and there lit his pipe. There being no male member of the family around, these proceedings were deemed very singular and suspicious, and somewhat alarmed the people of the house. Officer Andrew Smith took after him, but before that policeman got there Bowden had started eastward. He was caught, after a chase of five or six blocks, was taken before Justice Pyper and fined \$25.

Our Country Contemporaries.

Ogden Junction, Oct. 31.—

During the past summer the U. N. Railroad Company put a large pump alongside the bridge over the Ogden River for the purpose of raising water into their engines. The pump did not work satisfactorily, and the remains of the frame work were left standing. On Thursday last some miscreant tore away a portion of the scaffolding of the framework, leaving it across the track about the middle of the bridge, evidently with the suicidal purpose of throwing the train from the bridge into the river. Most fortunate-

nately, however, the vigilant engineer on the afternoon express train saw the obstruction barely in time to stop the engine a few yards from it, when, alighting from his cab, he removed the timber and brought the train safely to town.

Sudden death would scarcely be so severe a punishment for such a malicious attempt to throw a passenger train from the track as so dangerous a point, and it seems almost incredible that a sane person would attempt to commit such a dreadful crime. But two or three previous attempts to throw the train from the track near the same point, which have luckily been frustrated, indicate, in a positive manner, that there is some person or persons bent on causing a disaster. It may be mischievous boys who have placed the obstructions on the road, but the above named being the third attempt which has been made near that point within a few weeks, indicates a persistency scarcely to be attributed to boys. The most strenuous efforts should be made to discover the culprit, as a serious loss of life may result from this persistent malice.

A new street lamp, constructed on the Caloptro principle, has been successfully tested in London and abroad. England is officially pronounced to produce fifty per cent. more light than the common lamp.

Dr. Wm. Parker, of Conneville, Pa., was arrested at that place by Isaac Meyers, a special agent of the Post Office department, charged with using the post office for the purpose of defrauding certain persons in London, England. His scheme was to write to wealthy people in England, telling them their relatives were in distress from circumstances, and that he was taking care of them, and requesting money for their use.

A Spanish paper published in the city of Mexico says that the "United States are made up of the sum of the world." The two Republics, on a paper published in that city in the English language, and edited by Maj. Geo. W. Clarke, a well-known Confederate officer, returns the compliment by saying that "the sum of Spain goes to Mexico, and is the fruitful source of the most of the evils which afflict that country."

At our primary election, one of our sturdy sons of the mountains came into town to exercise his right as a free sovereign of a free State, and cast his vote for the man of his choice. He approached the polls and handed in a ticket. "What is the name?" asked one of the judges. "Johnson," was the reply. "Yes, but what is your other name?" The mountaineer became indignant, and declared that he had but one name, evidently thinking the official took him for a repeater. Yes, but what is your Christian name?" asked the judge. "My Christian name?" said the bold backwoodsman. "Why, if you want to know that, why, I am a Baptist." And so the man and vote were registered "Johnson the Baptist."—Tusculum Chronicle.
