A division of McMahon's corps, on the side of the French, and several regiments of Prussians were engaged, and the result, if the dispatches are reliable, was victory to the Prussians, who captured several hundred prisoners, and gained possession of the French camp. This is the first fight of any importance since the declaration of war, and this taste of blood will whet the appetites of the contending forces, and make them more eager for that "big battle on the Rhine" which is so anxiously awaited.

Fotheringham, Esq., who delivered a magnificent oration. But the feature of the day was a speech composed and read by Miss Julia, daughter of President Murdock, a young lady, 17 years of age. We have received a copy of the speech, which we consider highly creditable to its author.
