SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL

Board of County Commissioners Canvassing Election Returns.

Federal of Little Sidney Jackson—Wedding Permits—Estate of George Mole—The Bridewell Musicals.

The board of county commissioners met yesterday afternoon to canvass the returns of the election held on Nov. 4. Last evening they only completed the returns from the five city wards which show very little change in the result from that given in the "News" the day after election. The returns from the city give each of the Republican candidates a good majority. The Republicans also won out on the justices of the peace and constables, electing their candidates in each of the five city wards. The official count on justices and constables was as follows:

The election returns from the county precincts will be completed by tonight. The Socialists cast 273 ballots in Ogden City alone for their representative to Congress. Matthew Wilson, while two years ago they only cast 4 ballots for their representative.

The last sad rites over the remains of Little Sidney Jackson, the seven-year-old boy who was accidentally shot and killed Saturday by his little playmate, took place yesterday afternoon.

The funeral services were held at the West Weber meetinghouse, Bishop McFarland presiding at the services. The west choir furnished sweet musical selections. Elders Nathan Hawkes, H. C. Powers Sr. and Bishop McFarland were the speakers.

There was an exceptionally large attendance of sympathizing friends gathered at the church, and the beautiful remains were laid on the casket. A large funeral cortege followed the remains to the West Weber cemetery, where they were laid to rest.

The coroner's inquest, which was to have been held yesterday afternoon, was postponed on account of the funeral until this afternoon, when it will be held at 2 o'clock.

Halvorson and Sheriff Layne went to West Weber to be in attendance at the inquest.

CANNOT FIND CULPRIT.

Vagrant Takes Involuntary Bath In Hot Water—Wedding.

Provo, Utah Co., Nov. 11.—Sheriff Storrs and Special Agent Brown of the Rio Grande railroad, returned last evening from Goshen, where they were attending the shooting into the passenger train Sunday evening. They failed, however, to make any important discovery. Tracks made a search on the right-of-way fence at the place where the shots were fired, and where the man who fired them had evidently been standing. The tracks were found near the shooting and were eastward, where the man had been running after firing the shots, as the officers suppose. They stopped and went back a short distance, the tracks disappeared in a pasture. It was impossible for the officers to find anyone in Goshen who could give an opinion of the man who could be, and as a large number of citizens made a search on the tracks, the shooting and failed to discover him, the prospects for finding him now are rather slim. A man who rode along the train on Sunday morning, who, the officers are satisfied that he was not doing any shooting on Sunday and that he had nothing to do with the shooting, was yesterday evening. The officers are inclined to the theory that the man who fired into the train is insane.

OFFICIAL ELECTION RETURNS.

Isaph Sentenced to Serve One Year For Manslaughter.

Nephi, Utah Co., Nov. 10.—The county commissioners finished the official returns of the election on congressional and state tickets being as follows: King, 1,389; Howell, 1,382; Young, 1,389; McCarty, 1,387; Adams, 1,385; Grace, 1,261.

The vote on the county ticket remains about the same, though the Republican majority on the two commissioners which they claimed is cut down by the returns from Detroit and Fish Springs. As it now stands, the Democrats have elected their entire ticket with the exception of Hassell and McCane, commissioners, the latter winning out by a majority of four. The Democrats intend contesting his election.

ONE YEAR FOR ISAPAH.

In the district court today, Isaph, the young Indian who killed his father during the summer of last year, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment in the county jail. Isaph was held in the justice court for murder, but this charge was later returned in the district court to involuntary manslaughter, to which he pleaded guilty. He received the extreme penalty.

COALVILLE.

COUNTY SEAL WILL REMAIN.

Park City Lost by About 170 Votes—Widow's Day at Wanship.

Coalville, Summit County, Nov. 8.—The election is over, and the great fight over the removal of the county seat from Coalville to Park City is at an end, much to the satisfaction of all. This has been without doubt, says the Coalville Times, the hottest election ever held in the county, and the result could hardly be believed, and the great assurance Park City had over the removal is now turned into dust and disappointment.

The fight made by Coalville was honest and above board, and it was on this score that the election was won. The people in this end of the county are not getting a thorough trouncing is not the most pleasant feeling on earth, but, on behalf of the Wellsville Democrats, I rise to move that the election of Joseph Howell be made unanimous, for I know that the people of Utah can have nothing to fear at the hands of our Joe.
