THE BUILDING SITUATION. Contractors Are Employing Non-Union Men-Trouble May Develop.

The situation confronting the builders and unions in the city remains about the same as it was yesterday. The attitude of the builders indicate that they do not propose to be dictated to in any degree by the trades union, and the union is standing back and sullenly looking on while the structures throughout the ctly are going up under the hands

of non-union men. J. M. Anderson has only non-union men employed on the buildings that he is erecting on First South and Tenth East streets, and they have not been disturbed at all in their work. George Morrow has a force of non-union men tearing down the old California on South East Temple street.
