

BINGHAM MINES OF BINGHAM CON.

The Past Year Has Been One of Great Activity at These Big Properties.

GREAT MASCOTTE TUNNEL.

Has Cut Three Great Ledges Which Company's Locations Cover—Commercial Ore Reserves.

The past year at the mines of the Bingham Consolidated Mining Company has been an active one, and the new 1906 will dawn under bright skies. At the Dalton & Lark mines, which consist of the Dalton & Lark, Miner's Dream, Antelope, Yosemite No. 1, Brooklyn and Sampson mines, comprising in all about 400 acres, the campaign has been particularly vigorous.

From a point on this level connection was made on the Lark vein with the deep workings of the mine by a vertical shaft to the 1,250-foot level, thence to the 1,070-foot level, by an inclined winze, equipped with a gravity skip. All ore now mined from the Mascotte tunnel is transported to the railroad over the strike for a distance of approximately 7,000 feet.

During the year 1905 the Mascotte tunnel has cut out all these ledges. The Lark vein has over 1,000 feet of development work on this level, 700 feet westerly from the intersection of the tunnel and the vein, and 300 feet easterly. These drives east and west are in ore their entire length. A large tonnage of lead has been opened on the east side, while to the west the values run largely in copper.

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These combined properties have been producing from 200 to 300 tons of copper ore daily for the past year, the product being shipped to the Copper Belt railroad, thence via the Grand Western railway to the company's smelter at West Jordan, Utah, via a branch line from Revere station on that company's branch to Bingham.

During the season important developments have been made on the lower tunnel, and two new ore bodies have been opened up in virgin ground, which have practically doubled the ore reserves of this property.

The method pursued in mining the ore is known as the "North of England," or caving system of mining, which affords a very low mining cost. The lower tunnel connects with the loading station of the Copper Belt railroad, the upper tunnel being connected with the lower tunnel by means of a gravity road operated with skips running in balance.

The mill has its own power plant and generates its own steam and air power.

During the week closing yesterday 21 shippers forwarded to the valley smelters from the mines of Tintic a total of 156 carloads of ore, as follows: Ajax 4; Black Jack, 3; Bullion-Beck, 8; Brooklyn Consolidated, 3; Beck Tunnel, 2; Centennial Eureka, 4; Carissa, 2; Dragon Iron, 2; Eureka Hill leader, 2; Eagle and Blue Bell, 2; Grand Central, 12; Gemini, 30; Kinneer & Co., 1; Mammoth, 13; May Day, 3; Ridge & Valley, 4; Swansea, 7; Uncle Sam, 3; Victoria, 1; Victor Consolidated, 1; Yankee Consolidated, 5.

Shareholders of the Century Cold Mining & Milling company, operating in the Park Valley mining district, are in receipt of the annual report covering the past fiscal year.

The financial statement shows that on Nov. 30, there was an indebtedness against the company at McCormick & company's bank of \$15,043.30, against which was cash on hand of \$1,947.75 and gold bullion to the value of \$963.32, leaving a net indebtedness of \$12,432.23. An average of \$1,500 per month has been used in doing development work.

Manager P. W. Madison, who is giving his time to the company without compensation, returned from the mine on the 9th inst., and in his report says: "I have just returned from the mine, and can say that in my opinion, it looks very fair. We have made an uptake of 149 feet, and there is considerable tonnage of ore above same which has not been stopped because of the old workings caved and we had to make an upraise underneath, and which we are now up to. Furthermore, in the uptake, we struck a vein 18 inches to two feet wide which assays from \$40 down to \$5, and we expect considerable ore from it. We have also struck a vein in the west drift running in the main tunnel, which has averaged very satisfactorily. We have had no assay less than \$5, so far, and I think the property will be in good shape in the spring to have another successful run."
