CAMBLING DENS ORDERED CLOSED

"Gentlemen" of the Green Cloth Will Have to Go Elsewhere.

The expose in Saturday evening's "News" of the gambling dens which were running wide open in Salt Lake has had its effect and last night every den in the city was ordered closed and advised to remain closed, and there is no "for the present" order about it, either. The order does not only include poker games in the rear of saloons and the big halls on Commercial street, but the gambling clubs in high places including the Alta club. Chief Paul says there must be no more gambling in this city, and his officers will be in and in their power to see that the order is obeyed, if any of the gamblers are found doing business they will have to suffer the consequences. In giving the order Chief Paul included among the private gambling places in the city and said they, too, must obey the mandate. The order, followed by instructions given by the city council of Monday night, was given to the captain of police and in turn to the sergeants and patrolmen. The joints were all visited last night and the unpleasant news was broken, whether they or otherwise is not known.
