YOUNG CHRISTY DEFEATS FRANCIS

Opening of Salt Lake Athletic Club Well Attended.

THREE INTERESTING EVENTS

Colored Man Went Down in Sixth of What Was to Have Been a Twenty-Round Contest.

What was to have been a twenty-round go between young Christy and Jim Francis was suddenly terminated in the sixth round at the Salt Lake Athletic club last evening, when the colored man went down and out by three straight arm body blows and a jolt on the jaw. The referee became a bit excited and forgot to count, but it was the unanimous opinion of those present that Francis was "out" at least twelve or fifteen seconds.

There were practically only two rounds of fighting—the fifth and sixth. In the first four rounds the men sparred cautiously, each waiting for an opening. Christy fought high while Francis assumed an unnatural position for him and fought low. The men feigned and worked patiently for an opening. During the whole contest Francis did not land a single blow upon his young opponent. The latter did not swing or attempt to rush the fighting except in the first part of the fifth, but soon dropped these tactics and forced the colored man to go down by three straight arm body blows and a jolt on the jaw.
