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A FEAST IN ZIMULAND.

The Killing of the Cattle for the Feast at Zimuland.

A feast magnificent, long-haired warriors followed them in a gorge in hand. Crowding the cattle to a bunch up against the wall, each warrior singled out a victim, and with a mighty thrust plunged the knife, bright blade into the animal's heart. Generally speaking, the one swift, sure stroke was sufficient, but in two or three cases the stricken animals avoided the death thrust and, reeling to the left, the deep wound, made motionless for a few minutes, closing them frantically about the knife until some well-timed blow brought them to earth. One big steer, killed like a Texas, kept his feet, and fought until a dozen angry blades were buried in his body, and in his effort, reaching for his knife, he was a couple of times and signed one very badly in the thigh.

The whole affair was so exciting as a Spanish bull fight. When they were all killed the crowd, who had been cheering the fun, from the knoll, well, stepped into the arena and assisted in the work of skinning and cutting up. As they could get around an animal assisted, and one could scarcely imagine a more barbarous spectacle than a horde of Zulus skinning and dicing a dusty ox. The blood was allowed to remain in the flesh, and men, women and children were seen striding off the large pieces of red, quivering flesh along over their shoulders, with the blood trickling down their dark, dark skin to their heels. Children, however, their faces and bodies for fun, and about only men, a group of tall, black warriors looked and stalked, like the savages they were. While the women boiled the hide in big iron kettles, obtained from Natal, the warriors engaged in a big dance. You can never quite catch the spirit of a Zulu dance by merely hearing it described, any more than you can read in the explanation of wine without trying it. The warriors turned out about 200 strong on this occasion, and the dance took place on a level bit of ground outside the knoll. The whole country was gathered in a black mass, speckled in irregular patches on the grass to see the dance. After the horns had all been cut up the warriors retired to their huts. Then very shortly they came straggling out again, and by one, the blood washed off, and their bodies decorated with all the gew-gaws of war. Many were killed of Zulus and the tails of wolves and foxes were around their calves and legs were ornaments of head and of leopard skin. On each warrior's head was a dome of black antelope skin, polished until it looked like a mirror of jet. With six ribs about the waist and a single strap they trooped into the knoll until they were assembled.

Then, forming into ranks as natural as a company of grenadiers, they marched out onto the dancing ground, singing a strange, weird chant in accompaniment to the music of a small drum and measured tramp of feet. One could see at a glance now that every Zulu is a warrior born. Here they were, the fiercest savages to all kinds, naked as animals, yet playing with a bearing and precision of movement that European troops, with all their scientific training, could hardly hope to beat. Forward they stepped, then, flung out into a wide circle, two deep they stood, proud and erect, the most splendid specimens of martial manhood I ever saw, their black eyes gleaming with suppressed fire, their chests heaving and muscles twitching.

The tarantula is common in Spain, southern France and Italy, occurring in great numbers round the town of Tarragona. It has been found in Asia and also in northern Africa. This spider is to be found in dry places, partly overgrown with grass and fully exposed to the heat of the sun, living in an underground passage which it digs for itself, being it with its web. These passages are found in sections and some from quite an inch in diameter, often extending to the depth of a foot or even more below the surface.

The creature is very quick in its movements and eager in the pursuit of its prey. It waits only to kill one victim before it darts upon another, and it has been known to allow itself to be carried into the air by a large fly that it has attacked, rather than relinquish its hold.

The Unconquered Elm Graft.
