

### Dut of Seventy-six Contests Liberais and Laborites Secured Sixty-two Seats.

IT WAS A REGULAR LANDSLIDE

Three Members of New Ministry Returned by Strong Majorities-Gerald Balfour Badly Defeated.

London, Jan. 15 .- The Liberal land. ilde continues. Out of 76 contests today the Liberals and Laborites together secured 62 seats. The Liberal gains today show the surprising total of 42, while the Unionists gained only one seat, that of Hastings.

Two former cabinet officers went down before the storm of Liberal sentiment. Gerald Balfour, who was president of the local government in the Balfour cabinet, was defeated by at least a majority of 1,069 and Walter Hume Long, former chief secretary for Irelong, lost his seat for South Bristol, while Augustine Birrell, president of the board of education, defeated the Unionist candidate at North Bristol. Lord Hugh Cecil, leader of the Con-servative free trailers, was defeated at Greenwich, and T. Gibson Bowles, a Unionist free trader, lost at Kings Lynn, both being opposed by Chamber-

Aside from the overwhelming gains by the Liberals throughout the country the immense majorities secured in the urnover are causes of surprise to both

The composition of the new parilament up to the present is as follows: Liberais, 95: Unionists, 31: Laborites, 17: Nationalists, 18: Socialists, 1. The total Liberal gains number 64,

the gains made by the Laborites being classed among the Liberals. Twenty-one London districts voted today. Out of these hitherto Unionist strongholds the Unionists succeeded in

strongholds the Unionists succeeded in securing only seven seats. Three members of the new ministry were returned today by strong majori-ties—Herbert John Gladstone, secre-tary for home adialrs; President of the Board of Education Birrell and James Bayce, chief secretary for India. The attorney general, Sir J. Lawson Wal-ten, also received a large majority. Among the few Unionists who re-tained their seats were H. O. Arnoid-Forster, formerly secretary of war at Creydon, and Sir Howard Vincent at Sheffield. Newcastle-on-Tyne voted for two seats today, but the returns wera

two seats today but the returns were not declared tonight. These seats hitherto have given Unionist majorities, but it is predicted that the vote will be close and that both are likely to be furned over to the Liberals.



Albany, Jan. 15.-Albert T. 


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
