## FALL TURF DATES GREATLY CROWDED

Four Meetings on Metropolitan Tracks—Big Stakes Offered—Last of Fifteen.

New York, Sept. 19.—From now until the final closing of the racing season, Nov. 15, the fall turf dates will be crowded to the limit, great meetings are scheduled on metropolitan tracks, with a very interesting meeting at Pimlico, Baltimore, overlapping it. It is probable that Pimlico will attract some of the very best horses including several stakes winners.

The stakes schedules provided for the fall meetings are equal in attraction to the averages for the season, but for the valuable races Pimlico will make strong appeal to the horsemen because of the open betting at the Baltimore courses. The Belmont stakes has closed with the best horses of the year among the entries as at the last meeting of the season.

The Metropolitan Jockey club meeting at Jamaica a list of it stakes—true for all ages and two such for 3-year-olds and upward, with two for 2-year-olds—will close today, the chief event being the "Peregrine" handicap of \$2,500.

A list of 14 stakes—four for all ages, two each for 3-year-olds and upward, and six for 2-year-olds—will run at the Aqueduct meeting on Saturday of this week, the most notable race to be the Aqueduct Handicap of \$2,500. The shortest meeting of the season, with six days of racing will wind up the season at the Empire City Jockey club's Yonkers track.
