## THE STONE LECTURES.

Macedonian Missionary Speaks at the Theater, Prison and Phillips Church.

She lectured in the Sait Lake Theater Saturday night before 800 people, spoke before the state prison society of Christian Endeavor Sunday morning, and in the evening addressed a packed house at the Phillips Congregational church. # ROMNEY NOW A FREE MAN

Jury Returned a Verdict of "Not Guilty" on the First Ballot.

HIS MOTHER OVERJOYED.

End of the Case Came on Saturday Evening and the Prisoner Was Promptly Released.

Miles W. Romney is a free man. The jury which weighed the evidence in his case, after deliberating about a half an hour, returned into court at 8:20 o'clock Saturday evening and by its foreman delivered the following verdict:

"Not guilty as charged." It is said that the verdict was reached on the first ballot at just about 7 o'clock. Judge Hall, having gone to dinner, it was decided to not return the verdict until 8 o'clock and the court and the attorneys for the defense were so notified by Deputy Sheriff Booth, who had the jury in charge.

The defendant, his attorneys and his two brothers were notified and reached the court room before Judge Hail did. The news that a verdict had been reached had gained circulation and a air-sized crowd was present to hear the ame. It was \$:20 o'clock when Judge Hall arrived and convened court. The ury then filed in and Henry Kirkman, ts foreman, announced the verdict as

given above. Judge Hall then formally discharged he defendant and thanked the jury fo ts services and ordered court adjourned until 10 o'clock this morning. friends of Mr. Romney crowded around him with congratulations upon his acquittal. He thanked cach of them very arnestly and then, in company with his brothers and attorneys, left the court room and went directly to Judge King's office. The three brothers then went to their mother's home, at 227 E street, to break the news to her. She was overcome with joy at the news and

broke down and cried. Mr. Romney will probably return to farming. He went out to his farm yesterday and stated that he would prob-ably remain there, although circumstances might induce him to change his mind. He expressed no surprise at the erdict as he said he was confident of in acquittal from the very beginning of His attorneys, Judge King and J. M. Hamilton, expressed the same opinion about the matter and are jubi-lant over the verdict. Dist. Alty, Eich-nor was surprised at the verdict but stated that it was up to the jury to de-cide and if that was their verdict, that

The crime for which Mr. Romney was tried was for the killing of Harry Strong in the Casis saloon, on east Second South street, on Sunday, Sept. 14, 1902. He was charged with murder in the second degree and the plea of self-defense showed that Strong had made numerous threats against Romney's life and that on the occasion of the shooting, after the accidental discent a foreign twang, so that her speech sounds a good deal as though she was a charge of Romney's gun, he was in the foreigner.
