At Snowflake, Arizona, June 10th, 1882, MARGARET COOPER WEST, relict of Samuel West.

Deceased was born in Montgomery Co., Tennessee, December 9th, 1804. Baptized by Elder David Patten in the summer of '34. Moved to Kentucky in 1838; from thence to Nauvoo in the spring of 1842; from thence to Council Bluffs in 1846; from thence to Parowan, Utah in 1851; from thence to Snowflake in the winter of 1878-9. In connection with her husband, raised a large family of children, several of whom survive her. She remained to the end of her life a faithful, consistent Latter-day Saint.—COM.

At Mani City, U. T., June 18, 1882, of apoplexy, JAMES C. BROWN, aged 42 years. Brother BROWN was born at Bannockburn, Scotland, on January 11, 1840; was baptized July 1851, in the Glasgow branch; became a travelling Elder in the Edinburgh Conference in the year 1863; emigrated to Utah in the fall of 1864, making his home at Mani, where he resided until his death. He was one of the presidents of the 48th Quorum of Seventies. He resided actively filled the offices of Recorder and Mayor of Mani City with much credit. His death is deeply regretted.—COM.

Deceased was born in Swansea, Glamorgan shire, South Wales, March 7th, 1808, embraced the Gospel in her native land, and emigrated to Utah in 1854, leaving her children and considerable property for the Gospel's sake. She was sustained through all her trials and sufferings by a firm faith in the Gospel as restored in the latter days, and died in the hope of a glorious resurrection with the just. She had many friends, who with her husband and his family, mourn her loss.—COM.

IN MEMORIAM.

John S. Davis, who died in this city on the 11th day of June, 1882, was born in Carmarthen, South Wales, on June 7th, 1822. He early in life became a printer and publisher, and acquired in a high degree the art of his profession. He joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in his native country on the 19th day of April, 1846, and began immediately to work with zeal in the interest of his chosen faith, promulgating its doctrines both orally and by the many publications in the Welsh language of which he was the author. Of standard Church works, he at his own expense translated and published the Book of Doctrine and Covenants; he also published a hymn book whose songs were mostly composed by himself. He was for some time editor of a Welsh paper called "Zon's Trumpet," a paper which exercised a potent influence for the cause of the Church. He filled with satisfaction the positions of Second and afterward of First Counselor to the President of the Welsh Mission, also those of a Teacher, Priest and High Priest in the Church being the first to be ordained a High Priest in Wales.

He resided in Utah since 1851, has throughout his life contributed to various publications his writings in his native language, being highly appreciated for their literary merit. He was the author of a number of popular songs, among which may be named "The Busy Bees of Deseret," "All are talking of Utah."

Deceased to be a printer about the year 1861, on account of ill health. Especially among the Welsh-speaking people in Utah he has been widely and favorably known. His habits were temperate and moral in the extreme, and in his business transactions he was just almost to fault. His sufferings during four years prior to his death were great, but borne most uncomplainingly; now rest and peace are his portion. His last words uttered a moment before he died were "Oraen Pratt."

NOTICE.

Sec. 2207 of the Compiled Laws of Utah, is as follows:

"Every person who shall wilfully and maliciously cut, break or throw down any Telegraph Pole, or any tree, or other material used in any line of Telegraph; or shall wilfully and maliciously break, displace or injure any Insulator in use in any Telegraph Line; or shall wilfully and maliciously cut, break, or remove from its Insulator any wire used as a Telegraph Line; or shall by the attachment of a ground wire or by any other contrivance, wilfully destroy the Insulator of such Telegraph Line, or intercept the transmission of the electric current through the same; or shall in any other manner wilfully injure, molest or destroy any property or materials pertaining to any Telegraph Line; or obstruct or postpone the transmission of any message over the same, or procure or advise any such injury, interference, or obstruction, the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor."

The Sheriff, and his Agents, in whatever County the Company's lines are constructed, are empowered to prosecute to the full extent of the Law, any person, or persons, found violating the above Section, or any part thereof, so far as the property of the Deseret Telegraph Company is concerned.
