DEATH FROM TUMOR OF THE BRAIN.

Shortage of an Insane Asylum. Texas—Times Harry Thomas—Carnival Gibbons and the Indians.

The first test miles of the Los Angeles Electric Railway completed, a new electric line from San Pedro to the sea was opened to travel Saturday.

On Sunday thirteen prisoners escaped from the county jail at Sacramento, all of them succeeded in escaping the officers without a trial to follow.

The board of supervisors of San Bernardino County, Calif., has made arrangements whereby amphyphosis will be given to tramps. A rockpile has been created for the benefit.

Dr. David Starr Jordan, president of the University of California, and his wife, regarded by many as rank nobodies, has become converted by Mrs. Maud H. Morris' presence, and has joined the Salvation army.

A double marriage having rather peculiar features took place at San Luis Obispo, Calif., on Saturday. Two young men, William and Willard Thompson, sons of Mrs. Nora and Z. Thompson, were the contracting parties. The boys are twins and are the girls.

Lillian Mason and her troupe of bicyclists, who left Los Angeles on September 26, reached San Francisco, arrived at 1 P.M. on Tuesday. Monday, Oct. 1, and have been stranded ever since. They have enlisted some local wheelmen to assist them in an effort to get out of town.

Ernest Peck, 17 years old, was drowned while boating during a tour on the Columbia River near Portland, Wash. He stood up to catch a duck and capsized the boat. Two other boys named Parker who were in the boat held on until rescued, took time to reach the railroad and went down.

Bud Guy, the Meagher county, Cal., fugitive, who escaped from a posse in California, and after his parole terms, got away and was afterward captured in California, will be put on trial November 6th. The charge against him is the killing of a deputy who was in the posse with which the fugitive had a running fight.

Maurice N. M. Orr, secretary and treasurer of the board of directors of the California State Bank of the Union Bank of St. Louis, is short in his accounts about \$10,000. This is the aggregate of the many small sums of money belonging to invalid patients whom he has been entrusted to his keeping during the last thirteen years.

The Kaslo and Bonanza branch of the Canadian Pacific railroad, extending from Kaslo, in the Lake Kootenay, Co., southward to Bonanza, Col., forty miles distant, has been completed and will be opened in a few days. The road will give steamboat passengers an opportunity to take the train and bring along the outside world a rich mineral district containing many mines and groups of mines.

An Albuquerque, New Mexico, dispensary the Catholic church is about to undertake the christening of the Navajo Indians. Father Michael, chief of the Catholic Indian Bureau, who went with Cardinal Glorieux, and his party to the Navajo country several days with the officials of the tribe.
