Declare His Resolution of Tribute to Cleveland's Memory Is Only a Clever Move.

AIM IS TO RAISE DISCORD.

Johnson's Secretary Thinks It is Proper-Henry Watterson Denounces it, Terming Author a Hypocrite.

Denver, July 2 .- Charging that Alton B. Parker's resolution of tribute to the memory of the late ex-President Grover Cleveland is a clever move on the part of enemies of William Jennings Bryan to infuse factional feeling into the Democratic national convention. friends of the Nebraskan, today determined to offer a resolution of a character designed not to raise controverted political issues. Through control of the temporary organization of the conven temperary organization of the conven-tion the Bryan following expects to have its resolution brought to the at-tention of the delegates immediately after the speech of the temporary charman has been delivered. In that event the Parker resolution would have to be offered as a substitute. If embilited at all, and the Bryan men declare that the New York delegation would thereby he played in the attlwould thereby be placed in the attl-fude of attempting, under the guise of eulogizing a great party leader, to create strife and dissension and to make barmony impossible.

### CLEVELAND'S MEMORY.

All Democrats, without regard to factional affiliations, applaud the sug-gestion coming from New York that the mational convention should embrace the first opportunity of honoring the memory of Mr. Cleveland, but most of those who have expressed themselves on the subject are of the opinion that the resolutions adopted should not con-tain anything over which there could be the silvitest difference of opinion. The New York resolution, which was made public last night, is denounced by such Bryan leaders as Mayor James C. Dahlman of Omaha, and Judge M. E. Wade of Iowa, the member of the All Democrats, without regard to

C. Dahiman of Omana, and Judge M. E. Wade of Iowa, the member of the mational committee from that state. They declare that its adoption would be a direct slap at Bryan, and Insist that in giving it out for publication the New York delegation intended to dis-purage the Nebraska candidate.

WAS A BOMESHELLA

The publication of the Parker reso-lution was a bombshell exploding in the midst of the Bryan followers, and the short of the training of the convention ar-angements to head off its introduc-ion in the convention. The Bryan neople having possession The Bryan people having possession of the temporary organization, de-cided that the Cleveland resolution shall be presented to the convention by a man who will be recognized by Temporary Chairman Boll immediate-ly after the conclusion of his speech. If Judge Parker still desires to bring his resolution before the convention. resolution before the convention It must be offered as a substitute for the one which will be presented by the Bryan people. R. M. Johnson, the Texas member of

the committee on convention arrange-ments, said today: "If that Parker resolution is intro-duced in the convention it, will raise all sorts of a row. The friends of Mr. Bryan do not propose. Ender the guise of a resolution honoring Grover Cleveland, Mr. Bryan shall be attacked and his policies for the last 12 years held up to rebuke."

An in-vasion of the grief of the noble lady who waeps amid the silence and the solitude of the granite hills, a blow at party concord, it is the act of a shameless hypocrite. Nor was ever a professional ghoul inspired by a more mercenary spirit, because the sole aim and end of the Murphy-Connors crowd, aided by Judge Parker, is the perpetua-tion of the ascendancy of the Belmont-Ryan combination to which Democracy owes its last ignominons and well-de-severe defeat. Assures Bryan Delegates That The Judge is Utah's Choice For Second Place.

Denver, July 2 .-- Judge O. W. Powers, chairman of the Utah delegation to the convention, is among the early arrivals already in the city, although the delegation will not be here for several days.

"We are for Bryan first, last and all the time," declared Judge Powers today. "The delegation is instructed and bound by the unit rule. I could cast the votes today if necessary. The Utah delegation has already made its convention appointments so far as all the important committees are concerned. ### MURAT HALSTEAD DEAD.

Cincinnati, July 2 .- Murat Halstead, the veteran editor, died at his home here this afternoon.

Murat Halstead, one of the leaders in American journalism for over half a century, and widely known as a vigor-ous editorial and magazine writer, died at his home in this city this afternoon in his 79th year. At his bedside were his wife, his son Robert, and one daughter, Mrs. Arthur Stem. Mr. Hal-stead had been failing in strength for several months, and yesterday suffered from cerebral hemorrhage. His physi-clans this morning told the family that death was simply a question of hours, and those of the family at a distance were at once notified. Mr. and Mrs. Halstead celebrated their golden wedding anniversary a lit-tle more than a year ago, at which the Mr. Halstead's health seemed frail, and as time passed he grew weak-er, so that the news of his death was not wholly unexpected. The sudden death of his son Marshall a few months ago was a severe shock to him, and as believed to have had an effect on his Murat Halstead, one of the leaders in

Albert Halstead, another son, is American consul at Birmingham, Eng-land, and other members of the fam-ily are scattered throughout the coun-try.

The call does not apply to depositories to depositories, about 700 come within the \$30,000 or under.
