St. Margaret's church, Westminster, where the marriage took place, was brilliant with an assemblage of celebrities representative of both England and America. A detachment of the London Yeomanry, in which the bridegroom holds the position of major, lined the aisle, their uniforms mingling with the splendid gowns of the women in a glow of color.

The Duke and Duchess of Connaught, Ambassador Reid and Miss Reid, Lady Darnley and Cheylesmore were among the guests. The wedding gifts were superb. Had Miss Brees worn a quarter of the jewels showered upon her she would have been literally hung with diamonds. The bride is the daughter of the late William Lawrence Brees of Islip, L. I. Her mother, now Mrs. Henry Vincent Higgins, of London, gave the future countess a diamond crown. Three large stones, which form the central ornament, are worth a prince's ransom. The lordship of Brees dates from the time of William the Conqueror, passing in the reign of Henry III. to marriage to the De Willoughbys. The peerage of Willoughby of Brees was conferred in 1313, and the present Earl of Ancester is the twenty-fourth Lord Willoughby of Brees of his line.

HER ENGAGEMENT CAUSES QUITE A FUROR IN SOCIAL CIRCLES.

The gossips in the principal social centers throughout the country find a rich morsel for gossip in the engagement of Mrs. James L. Kernochan to John H. Foster, the young Englishman who came to this country a year ago as the friend and protégé of Peter F. Collier. There has been no end of quibbling about the alliance, chiefly because Mrs. Kernochan's mother-in-law, Mrs. James P. Kernochan, has several times denied that the engagement existed.

But on that point there is no longer any room for doubt. It was young Mrs. Kernochan herself who announced the engagement a week or more ago. Society did not find so much in this announcement to chatter about for the reason that Mrs. Kernochan and Mr. Foster had been seen together almost daily for the last few months.
