Salt Lake has the honor of producing perhaps the youngest city passenger agent of any railroad system great or small in the country. In the person of Robert N. Wilson, son of Judge E. A. Wilson of the Eighteenth ward, and a brother of Miss Ruth Wilson, the singer, who this week was appointed to the position above named for the Chicago, Rock Island system. District Passenger Agent Drake thinks he has the making of a representative railroad man in his new subordinate, and there are many in this city who are of the same opinion. "Bobby," as he is familiarly known on Railroad Row, has the hustling germ in his system and early developed an aptitude for hard work and push. Three years ago he was a messenger boy in the employ of the Deseret News, and to this day he is still held up as a model for all subsequent messenger boys to follow. He is only 20 years of age. His career will be watched with interest.

FLINT GOES FREE. The Supreme Court Orders Him Set at Liberty.

The supreme court yesterday afternoon ordered that Richard Flint be released from custody under the habeas corpus act. The opinion of the court was rendered by Justice McCarthy and concurred in by Chief Justice Baskin and Justice Barth. It holds that, after a lapse of 11 months, during which time sentence has been suspended on a trial, and he has been allowed to go on his own recognizance, a district judge has no further jurisdiction in the case and cannot, at that late date, order the defendant brought into court and sentence him for the crime for which nearly a year prior sentence had been suspended.

Wedded Friday the 13th. Had No Scruples About Taking Important Step That Day.

Yesterday, for the first time in many a month a marriage ceremony was performed in the county clerk's office on Friday, and that, too, on the thirteenth day of the month. TRIP TO LOGAN WAS DELIGHTFUL

COOKING MUCH APPRECIATED

President Kerr Delivers an Interesting Address—Practical Results of College Work.

The snowdrift near Syracuse Junction yesterday, which caused a delay of an hour and a half, interfered somewhat with the program which had been arranged by President Kerr and the faculty of the Agricultural college at Logan, for the entertainment of the members of the Legislature and their accompanying guests. No time was lost after the arrival of the 200 or more people in showing them the points of interest in and about this magnificent educational institution, and the laboratories, museum, mechanical departments, class rooms and dairy departments were rather hurriedly visited, and while everything seen was highly spoken of, regret was expressed that the time was so short as to prevent a closer inspection of the many things of interest which presented themselves. No matter how interesting sight-seeing may be, it does not appeal very vividly to anyone if he or she is possessed of an aching void, and there were a good many to whom the anticipated banquet was ready, was just at that time the most satisfactory part of the program and they fell to with a rattling good appetite. The reason for it was, that quite a number of the gentlemen, without getting breakfast and some with only a cup of coffee and something light, and they were nearly famished when the banquet came on to be served at the dining hall. The banquet had not been thought of, and a good deal of scolding and many pleasanties were indulged in while the special was stalled, by quite a few of the passengers, notably by some of the gentlemen of the press, who were making all kinds of fun about cooking school cookery and what they were going to do with the biscuits, which they said were probably as good as lard and butter. It was remarked that they devoured everything in sight and have since been trying to make amends for what they said on the trip, by showing long distance bouquets at the charming young ladies who did the cooking and the serving. Up to the present writing only one of them has been heard to say that he didn't eat anything well and must have eaten something yesterday that didn't agree with him.
