

The *Tribune* says: On the same subject, looking at the work of the convention from this distance, we are not prepared to say that the course followed is the wisest which could have been adopted in the present party emergency, but we must say that the independents have not acted without great provocation, and that they have kept their protest within republican methods and within the republican party, and what effect they will have upon the voters of the State cannot yet be estimated. Their ticket is in every way equal to that of the Cameron convention, and in one way, much superior. It was nominated by the people, not by a "boss." If it were not for the question of its regularity there can be little doubt that in the present state of exasperation against the family rule among the voters of Pennsylvania, it would receive two republican votes for every one cast for the Cameron ticket.

It has been ascertained from a member of Gov. Crittenden's party in this city, that on his return to Missouri, he will conclude negotiations for the surrender of Frank James and possibly other members of the James gang and thus put an end to the organization of brigands in Missouri. Frank James is now in Jackson County and instead of meditating more mischief is represented as being anxious to make the best terms possible for himself. Gov. Crittenden is fully informed as to his whereabouts and means to have him in custody inside of ten days. It is asserted that the whole gang will be broken up. The plans are all laid and only await the Governor's return for execution.

The *Telegram's* special from Baton Rouge says: In Baton Rouge a reign of terror exists in St. Martin's parish over the lynching of Joseph E. Jenkins and Eugene Azar, a negro, on the 16th inst. Bands of armed negroes are going about in St. Martin'sville swearing vengeance, and a war of races is dreaded. Sixteen of the lynchers have been arrested and are now in the parish jail. The lynching of the two men was of a character particularly atrocious. Jenkins' hands were not tied and when he grasped the ropes they broke both of his arms. His wife who was among the spectators also earnestly begged for his life. He had a week previously waylaid his brother-in-law Raphael Castile, near Breauz Bridge and shot and killed him. Azar had been arrested some time previous for killing a young man at Vallery Thibideaux, but at the inquest the killing appeared to have been in self defence, and he was let out on \$300 bail.

CHICAGO, 24.—The Woman's Christian Temperance Union State Convention voted to-day in favor of action looking towards female suffrage, by 61 to 47, after a spirited, almost heated discussion.

PITTSBURG, 24.—There will be a meeting of the iron manufacturers to-morrow, to take united action relative to labor troubles. Representatives will be present from all western mills.

SAN FRANCISCO, 25.—A Walla Walla dispatch says: Aldy Neal, a horse thief and generally disreputable character, was hanged by vigilantes near Rockford last Monday.

At to-day's session of the American Baptist Home Missionary Society's Jubilee Meeting Committee, the Chinese missions presented a report which was adopted, taking grounds against the anti-Chinese bill.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 22.—Emigration from Russia is progressing, and the Jews are selling their property at any cost and hurrying to the frontier. The mayor of Lemberg has directed the relief committee of that town to commence the disbursing of funds hitherto kept back. The Jewish committee at Berlin resolved only to help those whom the action of the Russian authorities or the destruction of their property obliges to emigrate, as they are no longer able to assist voluntary emigration.

Seventy of the principal firms in Moscow addressed a memorial to the minister of finance, setting forth the disastrous consequences of expelling Jews from Moscow.

BERLIN, 22.—The Berlin *Tagblatt* states that the German Embassy at St. Petersburg has been warned that the German Crown Prince, Frederick William, will run great danger if he attends the coronation of the Czar at Moscow, and that there is a deep undiscovered conspiracy against the Czar and his guests.

LONDON, 22.—Crivosnians crossed

the Montenegrin frontier and surrendered their arms to the Montenegrin troops. They were interned, the revolt thus ended.

A dispatch from Tilsit states that at a council of the Russian Imperial family at Peterhoff Palace it was decided, because of the receipt of alarming information touching the projects of Nihilists, to defer the coronation of the Czar for one year.

ST. PETERSBURG, 22.—A fire in the Jewish quarters of the Kevoe district destroyed 105 houses; damages 600,000 roubles.

ALEXANDRIA, 22.—Two more British gunboats and two Greek men-of-war have arrived.

LONDON, 24.—The Derby was won by Shotover, Quick Times second; Lorillard's Sachem third. Bruce, the favorite, came in fourth, time of Shotover 2.45. Betting against Sachem at start 8 to 1.

CAIRO, 24.—The situation is hourly becoming worse.

The Ministry continue hostile preparations. A line of torpedoes is being laid along the coast. The native carpenters and smiths were summoned to the citadel to-day.

All the officers were summoned to Abdin Barracks yesterday, and required to swear to defend the government against intervention.

An attempt has been made to exact a similar undertaking from the Bedouin Sheikhs, but they refuse to pledge themselves to resist Turkish intervention. The united squadron contract for three months' provisions.

VIENNA, 24.—Information has just reached here, that incendiaries have destroyed Smargon, a village near Minsk, and that the mob which fired the place, burned a number of Jewish babies alive.

ST. PETERSBURG, 24.—The regulations agreed upon by the committee of ministers, and approved by the Emperor, provide that henceforth Jews shall be prohibited from settling outside of towns and villages, except where Jewish settlements already exist. Jews are also prohibited from trading on Sunday and Christian holidays. These regulations only apply to governments where Jews are permanently settled. All contracts of purchase or tenancy with Jews are provisionally suspended.

CAIRO, 24.—The four parlors (moral negotiations) between the Consuls and the Ministry completely failed despite the great efforts. The Ministry refuse further negotiations unless the fleets withdraw. The Council of war decided in favor of active preparation.

The official journal publishes a ministerial statement intended to tranquilize the public mind, but privately the ministers use menacing language.

It is rumored that England and France have resolved to send an ultimatum to the Ministry, and if this is disregarded France will waive her objection to the landing of Turkish troops.

The Ministry are spreading a report that the naval demonstration was undertaken without the consent of the consuls. Arabi Bey's influence is consequently greatly increasing.

The Ministers are inciting the Uimas (priests) and the populace, representing that the fleets were sent to annex the country.

FLAPA, Mex., 24.—A duel occurred at this place this morning. The principals were Capt. Be. Igno Arevas, of the First corps, and Lieut. Aresto Ramirez, of the Fifth Battalion. Ramirez was shot and instantly killed.

MATAMORAS, Mex., 24.—A woman was attacked by a bandit on the road near this place, and robbed of her clothing and whatever valuables she had in her possession, and was beaten to death.

VIENNA, 25.—Four hundred houses belonging to Jews were recently burned at Vasilisuki.

Avarian agitation in the Baltic provinces is increasing. Peasants in Parnau have revolted.

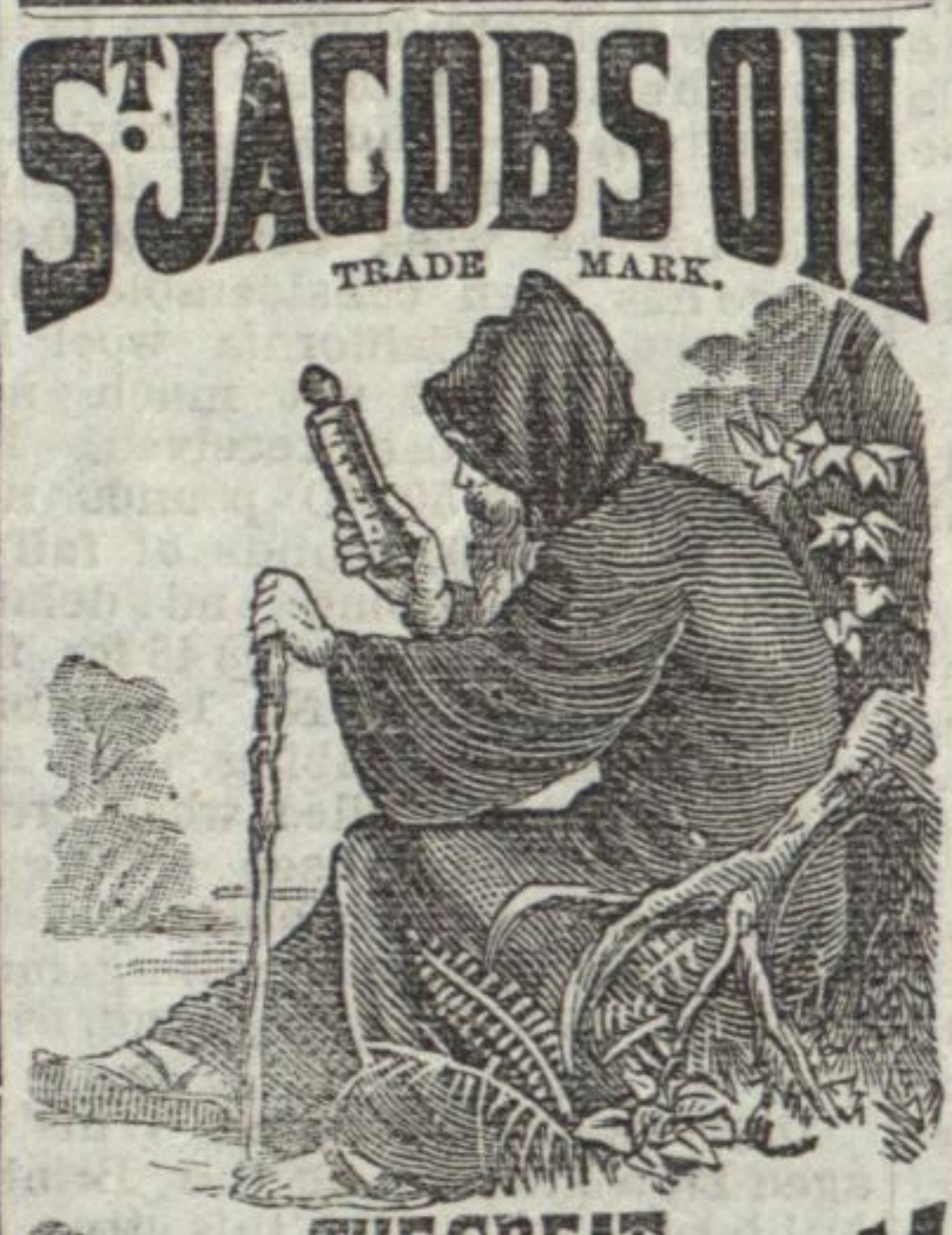
