President is Now Forty Miles
From Headquarters.

ON THE TRAIL OF THE LION.

Having a Good Time Studying
Animal and Plant Life and
Taking a Rest.

Cinnabar, Mont., April 10.—Secy. Leob received word from President Roosevelt today. The president is in the mountains at a camp 40 miles from his headquarters. When he started for this place yesterday morning, it was his intention to remain there for a number of days and possibly a week. Snow fell today in the vicinity in which the president has gone, but the fall was not heavy.

John Burroughs, the naturalist, did not accompany the president yesterday as he was suffering from a slight cold. This has almost disappeared now, and it is Mr. Burroughs' intention to join the president tomorrow.

While Mr. Burroughs will be with the president on and during his stay in the park, he will not accompany him on all his trips. The president is studying animal and plant life in the park and is enjoying himself there.

ON THE TRAIL OF A LION.

Butte, Mont., April 10.—A Cinnabar special says: It is generally believed here that the president, with Mr. Fisher and the escort, is off in the vicinity of Yancy's on a mountain lion hunt. They have taken most of the dogs from the post with them.

These are the very dogs which the president has been training for several weeks to track a mountain lion. The lion they have used for the purpose is one captured by "Buffalo Jones" last month.

The cub, for it is only a cub, is led along a trail by a trooper on horseback and then a few hours later the dogs are put on the scent.

Dr. Ruxey, surgeon-general of the army, who came down from Mammoth Hot Springs yesterday, left Livingston today for Washington. He will remain in the east until about the time for the president's departure from the park, when he will again join the party at either Gardiner or Livingston, and complete the remainder of the trip.

HURT BY FALLING DERRICK.

Five Men Injured at Mining Building at St. Louis Fair.

St. Louis, April 10.—Five men at work on the mines and metallurgy buildings at the world's fair site were injured, three of them probably fatally, by the falling of a derrick with several tons of building material.

INJURED.

Fred Antlinger, left leg and side bruised and injured internally.

John Murphy, right side bruised and injured internally.

Jefferson Powers, left arm dislocated and injured internally.

William Minter, three ribs broken and injured internally.

Antlinger, Murphy and Clayton are the most seriously hurt and may die.

At the same time Edward Wachutka, a work on the transportation building, was started by the crash of the falling derrick, fell and was crushed by a heavy timber he was carrying.

Trust Dissolving Proclamation.

Chicago, April 11.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Trenton, N. J., says:

Gov. Franklin Murphy's annual proclamation, forcibly dissolving those trusts and corporations organized under the laws of the state which have not paid annual tax has been sent to the printers. Nine hundred and twenty-seven concerns, capitalized in the aggregate at \$229,000,000, are affected.

Sold Into Servitude.

Chicago, April 11.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Jackson, Ky., says:

James Marcum has been sold into servitude for six months under the bargain law. Marcum had been a reputation for idleness and horror of work that the highest bid for him was \$100. The bid was made by William Griffith who will provide for him for the time he is in servitude. Marcum is 27 years old and a member of a well-known family. United States Court Commissioner James B. Marcum is his uncle. The young man was tried at last term of court, and the jury found he should be sold into servitude.

Carnegie on Social Gatherings.

Toronto, Ont., April 11.—Andrew Carnegie is quoted as saying in his reply to an invitation to attend a demonstration of Canadian born persons from all parts of the continent, to be held in July:

"Any movement such as that which you describe moves me deeply. The closer people of the old home and the new gather together, the better they know each other, the sooner will they know that day, when I am certain is near, when they will be united and have the peace and prosperity of the world. That the people of Canada and the United States and of Great Britain are to remain divided, talking of boundaries and military forces on one side or the other to protect one from the other, is not to be thought of. Some day they will come together and live together in all international affairs. Indeed, they will not be different nations. They will be one politically, as they are racially."

Prehistoric Burying Ground Found

Hopewell, Ky., April 11.—Prof. Warren Morehead, curator of the department of archaeology of Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass., has discovered on a farm east of this place what he believes is the burying ground of a prehistoric people.

Prof. Morehead examined 19 skeletons, several buried in a fair state of preservation. He is making a preliminary investigation in the region and probably will be followed by a party of archaeologists from Yale college.

The bones found he pronounced to be those of an extinct race of mound builders. All the skeletons were in receptacles built of flat stones. Stone axes were found in several graves and a stone knife was found in one.

Prof. Morehead will continue his investigations for several days.

Reggie Vanderbilt Wipes a Man.

Chicago, April 11.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from New York, N. Y., says:

Affairs at Sherman Institute.

Riverside, Cal., April 11.—A peculiar condition of affairs exists at Sherman institute, the government Indian school here. The appropriation for the employment of teachers proved to be inadequate and not wishing to labor for the love of humanity alone, the teachers decided to quit in a body until July 1, when more funds will be available.

Boys Fight Fatal Duel.

Chicago, April 11.—A dispatch to the Chronicle from New York says:

With pistols for weapons and the distance 20 paces two boys in knickerbockers fought a duel last night at Fulton street and Broadway, Brooklyn. Michael Helasco, aged 17, dropped at the crack of his adversary's pistol. The surgeons at Bushwick Central hospital said the wound would be fatal. Jos. Gosling, aged 13, was arrested and looked up charged with attempted murder. Gosling and Helasco had been playing cards.

Frick Will Not Accept.

Portland, Ore., April 11.—Henry Clay Frick, prominently mentioned by the anti-Carnegie faction in the United States steel corporation as a probable successor to Chas. M. Schwab, president of the company, declares that he will not accept that position. This is the statement Mr. Frick made in Portland yesterday as he was passing through the city on his way to his home in New York.

Richard Canfield Soon to Return

New York, April 11.—Richard A. Canfield, charged with running a gambling house, will return from Europe within a month, according to one of his intimate friends and business associates. He expects, they say, that he will have to stand trial in this city either in June or July, and that he will be in a position to go to Saratoga and open his club house there when the summer season begins.

Crocker Not Coming Back.

New York, April 11.—Richard Crocker will not return from London in July or at any other time, cables the World's London representative. Replying to an inquiry he telegraphs from Letcombe Regis:

"My last announcement was final."

In this announcement Mr. Crocker said:

"I have decided for all I am not returning to New York."

Commercial Cable Co. Supplies.

San Francisco, April 11.—Today on the steamer Alameda, 17 employees of the Commercial Cable Cable company will leave for Honolulu with 350 tons of freight and provisions. They include three chief operators for Midway, four for Guam and a number of carpenters and electricians. In the freight which they take with them are included unfired houses, tents, cable instruments, batteries and all the necessary paraphernalia for installing instruments and establishing quarters at the landing stations at Midway and Guam.

Charles Curtiss, chief electrician of the Mackay Cable company, has just arrived here from the east on his way to the orient to meet the cable ships that are to lay the cable between Manila and Honolulu. He says that the work will begin at Manila and will be completed by July 4.

VERDICT IN PENNELL CASE

Judge Murphy Does Not Find That
He Committed Suicide.

STATEMENT FROM DEAD MAN

Had Nothing to Do With Burdick
Murder—Connection With Di-
vorce Proceedings.

Buffalo, April 10.—The evidence given today before Justice Murphy at the inquest into the deaths of Arthur R. Pennell and Mrs. Pennell will not help the authorities in any way to a solution of the Burdick murder mystery. Whether the tragedy at Getzels stone quarry on March 10, in which Pennell was killed and Mrs. Pennell was fatally injured, was due to an accident or design was not proven.

Thomas Pennney, who has acted as attorney for the Pennell family since Arthur Pennell's death, declared that so far as he was aware nothing in the papers left by Mr. Pennell would throw any light upon the murder of his son-in-law. When questioned regarding the alleged delinquencies of Pennell, Arthur Pennell, brother of the dead lawyer and administrator of his estate, who has possession of most of the papers, informed the court that he did not know where he was or when he would return to Buffalo.

"Evidence that will show delinquency would simply be cumulative," said Justice Murphy, after the evidence was all in. "No stronger motive could be proven than has already been brought out here. But proving a motive does not establish suicide. The court is prepared to announce its findings." Judge Murphy then delivered his verdict as follows:

VERDICT OF JUDGE MURPHY.

"I find and certify: That Arthur R. Pennell came to his death on the 10th day of March, 1903, as a result of injuries received while riding in an automobile, the said automobile plunging from an embankment into the Getzels stone quarry."

"I cannot determine from the evidence submitted whether such plunge was accidental or designed."

"That Carry Lamb Pennell came to her death as a result of the said plunge of the automobile into the quarry."

"W. C. Omphillius, Pennell's stenographer, produced a typewritten copy of the first draft of a statement prepared for publication by Pennell, dated March 10, 1903. The statement in full is as follows:

PENNELL'S STATEMENT.

"To the Public—Now that the flood of sensationalism and yellow journalism has lessened and that public excitement has died down to a calmer consideration of the facts and events leading up to a terrible tragedy which I, in my behalf of myself, but especially more in behalf of others whose sufferings are even greater than mine, to make this statement:

"Owing to the fact that my name was so unfortunately at this time connected with the pending divorce proceedings in my case, and the great publicity in connection with the tragedy, I was unable to do as any possible connection with that crime was concerned I am satisfied and I think the district attorney and his assistants are perfectly justified in their action. I had nothing to do with it, and since that time neither has my house nor myself been under suspicion or surveillance."

"Being out for a short time in the early part of the evening, I spent the rest of it at home, as was shown by the evidence of my wife and the servant girl in our house. I think I was so acquitted by the public and the authorities of any connection with the crime."

"It now becomes incumbent upon me to make a statement relative to my connection with the divorce proceedings. In this statement I wish to say as little as possible about the dead. But it must be remembered that those who defend a man who lives to live and the rights of the living are greater than the rights of the dead. There was no truth in the charges brought by the plaintiff in that proceeding against the defendant against myself. The charges were absolutely denied under oath and counter-charges had been made, and in a short time the case would have been quietly tried before a referee and settled."

"The relations existing between the plaintiff and the defendant had been strained for some time. Twice he had attempted to make her leave her home. My wife and myself had taken her side in the controversy that arose between them and she had consulted me for legal advice and protection."

"During this time the man himself was in intimate relations with a woman whom he desired to marry. For that purpose it was necessary to be free from his wife. He discovered the fact that his wife knew of these relations by gaining access to safe deposit vaults where she kept her papers through forcing a written order upon her blank signature and purloining the keys from her. Being thus apprised of the evidence against him, he determined to anticipate her action by bringing an action himself, in order that he might have the appearance of being the injured party, and, out of the vindictiveness and desire to be free from his wife, he discovered the fact that his wife knew of these relations by gaining access to safe deposit vaults where she kept her papers through forcing a written order upon her blank signature and purloining the keys from her. 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
