Attempt to Connect Idaho Land Board With Methods Resorted To in Canyon Co.

WATER RIGHTS.

CONTRACTS FOR

STATEMENT BY COV. COODING.

State Banking Law in Full Force And Effect-Boise's Memorial Day Celebration.

Special Correspondence,

Boise, Idaho, May 16 .- An attempt has been made during the past few days to connect the state land board with the method by which the Canyon County Canal company made contracts for water rights, covering the lands opened under the Carey act, on May 1. It was claimed that the Canal company had done something unlawful in not having a drawing for preference of contract for water and entry on the Carey lands, and that it had been permitted to do this through the carelesspess or connivance of the land board. Gov. Gooding, who was in the north at the time this charge was made, was telegraphed by interested parties, and made the following straightforward statement. In his statement the gov-

ernor says: "The matter is perfectly plain and ernor says: "The matter is perfectly plain and simple. The state's connection with Carey act lands is very similar to that of the United States land office with public lands, being wholly ministerial in merely receiving the filing that had previously been acquired by citizens from the company furnishing water for the lands. In this case Gov, Mor-rison's administration made a contract with the Carey act. This contract fix-ed the price for water to be paid the company at not over \$30 an acre, and the law fixed the price of the land to be paid the state at 50 cents an acre. This contract has not since been charged nor questioned in any way. When the tract was ready for opening advertisements were published an-nouncing the terms and date. I myself supposed the selections would be made by lot as at Twin Falls, but on inquiry and on submitting the question to the altorney general, it was learned that the company had exclusive jurisdiction as to how to dispose of its rights and tides in order to realize on the invest-ment. In the Twin Falls case the company "In the Twin Falls case the company preferred the ballot system to making its own allotments. The state had no right, and made no attempt to in-terfere in either case, its authority be-ing limited to registering the filings issued by the company for water rights, and receiving its 50 conts per acre, just as the United States land offices do in filings on public lands. In case of con-test the state hears and decides the context, but otherwise does not come listo contact with or have any jurisdic-tion over the purchaser of water from the company, any more than the United States registers and receivers do over those applying to file on public lands. "The state's obligation is to see that the state sobligation is to see that the state has nothing to do with who purchases the water, or what the purchases the water, or what with who purchases the water, or what the purchaser does with it afterwards. If state officials have purchased titles from the company for their own use they have a right to do so, and the company could not well refuse their money. But I know nothing as to whether they have or not. I have not the slightest control over, or interest in, whether they buy Carey act lands, United States timber, town lots or otherwise." purchases the water, or what

Monday, May 15, 1905; The weather during the week was noteworthy for its pronounced unseasonable character. Temperatures were abnormally low, falling in many localities below the

failing in many localities below the freezing point, with frosts, some co-damaging character. Storms followed, and every form of precipitation oc-curred, rain, snow, sleet and hall al-ternating. Only during the last two days of the week did the weather be-come settled, and ended with clear skies and racidly rising temperature. come settled, and ended with clear skies and rapidly rising temperature, The heavy precipitation and conse-quent wet condition of the soil arrested the work of planting. Notwithstanding the unfavorable conditions, the growth of crops was very good. The early sown grain was coming up to good stands, and alfalfa was making good advance-ment.
