**LOCAL BRIEFS.**

**Campers Return**—Twenty-eight Y. M. C. A. campers returned home yesterday afternoon, after a pleasant outing at Camp Jolly, Bountiful. They brought back two young eagles.

**"Chink Student" Arrested**—Immigration Inspector J. T. Longley has arrested a Chinaman at Rock Springs, who came to this country as a "student," but found a job as a waiter at Rock Springs instead of studying.

**Gets the News Late**—The schedule showing the names of the troops stationed at Fort Douglas since its foundation, published in this morning's Tribune, was published in full in the last Christmas News.

**Chinaman Injured**—A child of Confucius named Ching Tiao was thrown from his vegetable wagon on Sixth East street yesterday afternoon, and seriously injured. Police Sgt. Roberts took the Chinaman home to his shack at Fifth North and First West streets.

**Found Milk Good**—The city chemist has just completed the examination of another list of local milk samples, and finds them all up to the mark, 12.5 per cent. of solids, except in three cases only. All of the samples were found clean and free from appreciable sediment and foreign odor.

**Frees to Travel**—Ellis Freed leaves next Tuesday, for Manila to go into business there. He will be accompanied by his parents to the Luzon capital, the latter remaining a few weeks are visiting Japan, China, India, Egypt, and then Europe. Mr. and Mrs. Freed will be absent from Salt Lake about two years.

**S. L. Public Service**—Articles of incorporation will be filed on the 15th inst., by the Salt Lake Public Service company, which has secured a site for its plant at Third West and First South street. The grounds cover 8x15 rods on Third West, and 5x15 rods on First South street, and the consideration was \$21,000.

**William D. Owen Operated On**—The many friends of William D. Owen, the veteran traveling man for Z. C. M. I., will be interested to learn that he underwent a surgical operation for stone in the bladder at the L. D. S. hospital yesterday morning. The operation was performed by Dr. Wright and Mr. Owen at last accounts was resting comfortably and making good progress.

**Busy at Armory**—The state armory is a busy scene today, with preparations for the Wyoming encampment. The troops from the south will arrive this evening, and camp out over night in the armory. The special train will run in two sections, the first for the live stock, and the sections will run 30 minutes apart. At Ogden an additional car will be added for Company B.

**Entertained Ward Choir**—The Seventeenth ward choir members were handsomely entertained last evening, at the residence of A. F. Barnes, 147 north First West street. The gathering was in honor of Miss Mary Colbert, of the choir, who is shortly to wed George Pace of Bountiful. The evening was spent in singing, games and dancing, with light refreshments.

**Vets On Journey**—When No. 4 pulled out last night, over the Rio Grande, it carried 25 members of the Utah G. A. R. and 25 members of the Idaho G. A. R. en route to the national encampment at Minneapolis. Eric Leving, R. G. Sleser expressed the belief that the encampment of 1907 would be held in Salt Lake. Fully 30,000 men are expected to march in the great parade.

**Woman Badly Beaten**—Charles Townsend, colored, was arrested yesterday on the charge of assaulting and beating his wife. The fellow was taken before Judge Diehl and stated that he would take 24 hours to enter his plea. His bond was fixed at \$10 and he was released. Townsend then returned to his home and gave his wife a most unmerciful beating. The man was again arrested and the woman was brought to the station. She looked like she had been through a threshing machine.

**Really Transfers**—E. H. O'Brien has bought from Morrison, Merrill & Co., 5x10 rods at 1073 Third street for \$1,000. J. A. Welch has bought the Sears property 5x10 rods on Fifth street near B. for \$2,250, and will build two houses there. L. Thomas has bought from G. R. Bothwell, the premises 612 east Sixth South street for \$2,200. Mrs. Hollander has bought L. H. Davis' cottage on Fifth East street near Third South for \$2,250. E. Stewart has sold to James West, the premises 1422 Major avenue, for \$3,000.

**Monthly Death Rate**—During the month of July there were 72 deaths in the city according to the monthly report issued by the city board of health. The average death rate per 1,000 was .36 per cent. Twenty-seven cases of contagious and infectious diseases were reported during the month. The food inspector made 832 inspections and condemned 16,883 pounds of food. The fumigator disinfected 25 houses, consisting of 96 rooms during the month. Fifty-nine samples of food and milk were tested by the city chemist.

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**DIG DRAWING FOR SHOSHONE LAND**  
Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Will Undoubtedly Decide to Select Townsite.

**SYNDICATE OFFERS PRICE.**

Will Give \$15,000 If No 1, Will Relinquish His Rights—Fillings Come Aug. 15th.

(Special to the "News.")  
Lander, Wyo., Aug. 9.—The last name for entry on the Shoshone Indian reservation was drawn from the big wheel here today before yesterday. Seven thousand, two hundred and forty names were drawn, and all will be entitled to select homesteads. The remaining 3,500 names which remain in the box will be drawn out at some later time and the depositors, or registrants will be notified if they are entitled to file for land. The drawing passed off without a hitch of any kind. On Aug. 15 the land office will accept the filings of the lucky homesteaders. The man drawing number one from the box will have the first choice, and after him number two, and so on. Those who drew numbers and who care to can examine the lands to be located and make their selection.

Nos. 1, 2 and 3 will probably select townsites. The holder of number one will receive \$15,000 if he will relinquish his rights to a syndicate that proposes to establish a large town in the reservation.

**GOV. GUILD INTERESTED.**  
Massachusetts Executive Writes Concerning Irrigation Congress.

Governor Curtis Guild, Jr., of Massachusetts, has written a letter relative to the approaching irrigation congress at Boise, in which he says:

"I am very much interested in the irrigation problem, and in the stupor of tour which I took with the president in 1900, through the sagebrush country of the west. I directed his attention to the possibilities of the land if only water could be loosed upon it. We feel in the day state that if we assist the west to vote for legislation that is especially to benefit our part of the country, we should be equally ready to show interest in national legislation that benefits you. You are at entire liberty to quote me as personally endorsing the bill, and the encouragement of irrigation, and in saying that we of the Atlantic coast believe in looking at this matter from a national view-point, as a subject in which all citizens should be interested."

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**MCCREA IS APPOINTED.**

Will Succeed Pennell Cherrington as Assistant U. S. Attorney.

Attorney William M. McCrea is today receiving the congratulations of his many friends over his appointment as assistant United States district attorney for this state. Dist. Atty. H. E. Booth received a telegram last night from the department of Justice at Washington, notifying him of the appointment of Mr. McCrea as his assistant. The appointment becomes effective on Aug. 16. Mr. McCrea succeeds Pennell Cherrington, who has been assistant attorney for the past eight years, having served under C. O. Whitcomb and Joseph Lippman. Soon after the appointment of Mr. Booth as district attorney he asked for Mr. Cherrington's resignation, but the latter refused to step out. A second request was made and he still refused to resign, whereupon the attorney general at Washington was notified and Mr. McCrea's appointment was made, thus relieving Mr. Cherrington of the position. Mr. McCrea graduated from the Cornell law school in 1894, since which time he has been practicing law in this city. He has been very active in politics in behalf of the Republican party and was elected as a member of the lower house of the legislature in 1904 and served his term with credit. At present he is secretary of the Republican state committee.

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**CONSULAR AND TRADE NOTES.**

Enamel ware for domestic purposes is now in decided demand in Jamaica, reports the Canadian commercial agent at Kingston.

Consular Agent George A. Olsen of Roseland, reports that a greater number of miles will resume operations this year in the Kootenay region of British Columbia, with the price of metals going up and the cost of mining, smelting and reducing gradually going down.

Another use for bananas is that of making what is called banana coffee. A firm in New York manufactures banana flour and also banana coffee, but they complain that they find very little sale for the flour. The same complaint was made by a London firm which handled banana flour.

A California ostrich farmer is about to open a branch office in London, where he will have a collection of ostriches. Unwieldy customers will be attracted to feathers cut direct from the backs of the ostriches, manufactured

under the customers' eyes, and sold to them across the counter "at a price they never heard of."

The Central South African Railway's administration is considering the question of establishing a steel plant to deal with scrap. Of this the administration owns a large quantity, but can find no local use or market for it. A similar plant, owned by a company, is in course of erection at Zuerfontein, Transvaal.

The amount of lumber sent from Nova Scotia to American ports this year is very large, reports Consul-General Holloway of Halifax. The cut in general, however, exceeds any cut known there for many years. The lumber shipped from Cornwallis is largely supplied by the New York Lumber company, which owns 45,000 acres at Gaspeaux Lake.

With the object of further improving and developing industries, the department of agriculture and commerce of Japan is to dispatch agents to Europe and America to make purchases of up-to-date machinery. For example, dyeing and weaving machinery will be purchased, to be rented to those so circumstanced as to be able to use it to advantage under regulations.

A Liverpool firm has announced a sale by auction of a consignment of caudex cotton, grown by Dr. Thomas of Carayonica, near Cairns, North Queensland, this being the first lot of Australian cotton ever offered in Great Britain, states London Commercial Intelligence. Doctor Thomas produced the variety by hybridizing a Mexican and Peruvian variety. The result was a tree cotton, for which great things have been predicted.

The increased export of cement to the United States from Belgium is noted by Consul-General Church of Antwerp. He gives the total amount of cement shipped from that city in the month of May as 22,592 tons, at an average of 14.75 c. b. The official Belgian statistics for May, however, only show 5,020 tons of cement exported to the United States, adds Mr. Howe. While the facts seem contradictory no explanation is offered.

**HAD NARROW ESCAPE.**

Careless Auto Driver Nearly Killed Woman and Girl.

Mrs. Annie Martensen, residing at 359 Curtis street, and her daughter Mae, aged 13 years, had a narrow escape from death last night while driving in a buggy on Main near Tenth South street. Mrs. Martensen and daughter were driving south on the west side of the street, when a big auto came north on the same side of the street at a high rate of speed. In the automobile were five men and a woman. Mrs. Martensen became frightened at the sight of the auto and tried her best to drive out of the way, but the big machine crashed into the buggy, badly damaging it, and threw the woman and child to the ground. Both were bruised and shaken but neither was seriously injured.

The auto belongs to the Salt Lake company and the driver was R. D. Shirk. The company says it will pay for the damage done.

**SCABBIES IN THE BIG HORN**

Part of the County Has Been Placed Under Quarantine Regulations.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Aug. 10.—An outbreak of scabbies among the sheep of Big Horn county was recently brought to the attention of the state board of sheep commissioners, and a section of the county has been placed in quarantine and the sheep have been ordered dipped between Aug. 10 and Oct. 10, 1906. There has been infection there for several years and all efforts to eradicate it without a general dipping have been fruitless. The infected section lies north of the Shoshone river, east of Clark's Fork and along the Montana line to a point where the Shoshone river crosses the state line.
