FRUIT SHIPMENTS FROM UTAH COUNTY

Fifty Cars of Peas and Prunes, 25 of Peaches, and 75 to 100 of Apples.

(Special to the "News") PROVO, Sept. 7.—In spite of the late frost this spring, which greatly injured the peach and other fruit crops, it is estimated that about 50 cars of peas and prunes and 25 cars of peaches will be shipped from this point...

While the frost did a great deal of damage to the fruit crops this year it is not likely that this will be repeated in the future. In the first place it is an unusual thing, but even if it should occur again, the orchardists will be prepared with manures to save their orchards, as is done in Colorado. It is estimated that about 500 cars of potatoes will be shipped and that the tubers will bring about 20 cents a bushel at shipping time.

There will be about eight cars of honey to ship out of the state, which will bring in \$2,000 a car. Much land is also being devoted to cantaloupes, and the success attending the cultivation of cantaloupes promises increased acreage in the future, the return being from \$125 to \$200 an acre. In addition to the fruit and vegetables shipped, large quantities will be carried by the local carriers.

DECLARES THERE IS NO COAL SHORTAGE

State Coal Mine Inspector Says no Haise in Price is Imminent, But Advises Buying.

J. E. Pettit, state coal mine inspector, has recently returned from a trip of inspection of the various coal mines in the state. While there is a scarcity of cars, there is no shortage of coal, he says, and an increase in the price is not imminent. But the inspector advises the residents of Salt Lake to buy their winter supply of coal now while there is plenty on the market.

There are several new mines starting up in the southern part of the state, and he believes that the output this winter will be heavier than ever. The coal shortage is attributed to the recent washouts in the western part of Colorado. The damage is being repaired and the shortage in cars should not last more than six weeks, he says.

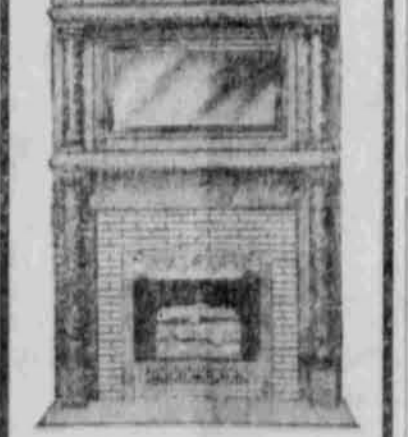

EXAMINATIONS FOR TEMPORARY CENSUS CLERKS

Washington, Sept. 7.—Examinations for approximately 2,000 temporary clerks to be appointed in the census bureau of the thirteenth decennial United States census are to begin Oct. 23. The examinations are to be held at various places throughout the country, according to an announcement relative to the examinations and appointments, which have been issued jointly by the department of commerce and labor and the United States civil service commission. The appointments for the census work will be given salaries of \$600 per annum at the beginning but promotions to \$750 will be given to those who render satisfactory service. The appointments are to be on probation, subject to termination at the end of one month or any later period, provided the appointee fails to make the requirements. All appointments will expire by law on June 30, 1912.
