Wiison, Wyo., May 25.-After the awful account of the recent storms in Montuna and other places nearer home, some of your readers may be interested in hearing how we fared in Jackson's Hole. The storm that caused so much loss of life and proparty in Montana merely gave the land a good sonking here. Snow fell to a depth of three to six inches one day and disappeared the next, benefitting the grass on the range and the grain that had been sown. One enterprising rincher near Jackson had just finished planting about 100 acres, the last of which was just showing above ground when I saw it two or three days after the storm. With a fair season he expects to thresh about \$400 bushels of grain next fall, and is sure of a market for it all right at home, and at a good figure. The threshing machine brought into the valley last sea-son by Balley Brothers has given quite an impetus to farming this spring.
