They allege that the property was worth much more than \$21,000 and that E. L. Chapman did not act for himself. but for Connell and Murray. They say they never assented to the action of the administrator, whose authority was limited to paying the debts of the es-tate, and the estate had no debts in Montana. It is also alleged that the court exceeded its jurisdiction in the matter, and had no right to substitute the administrator as a defendant in the soit. The heirs, therefore, ask that all proceedings under the McCormick partition suit be set aside and that they be restored to an eighteen-sixty-fourth interest in the Arctic lode claim. It was claimed that the opposition to Captain Warwick was not so much from members of his own company, as from other com-panies in the regiment. It had been passed along among the other com-pany commands that D company was a "gentleman's company," and was above associating with the others. But this is strenuously denied, and members of D company say they by no means con-sider themselves better than the other company commands, and are not above associating with them.
