Each bank, banker, broker or exchange dealer, on making application for license, shall make a statement under oath, aworn to before the Mayor or City Recorder, of the amount of capital to be employed such statements shall be filed in alphabet ical order, and yearly licenses may be is-sued thereon, as follows, viz:— With Capital of \$300,000 and over, \$500 00

A keeper of a billlard table is one who possesses or ke ps, or has the control, or manpossesses or ke ps, or has the control, or management of one or more bilitard tables whereon others are permitted to play, and for the use of which, or privilege of playing thereon, or for the bire thereof any money or its equivalent, or any check or outner in lies of money, shaft be paid or received; and all billiard tables within the City shall be held and taken to be so kept, and to come within the meaning and provisions of this Article, except such as may be kept within dweiling houses for owner's reoreation and not for the purpose of latting the creation, and not for the purpose of letting the same to others to play thereon for money, or anything representing or in lieu of money, or for wagers or bets; and there shall be levied and collected for every license to keep billiard tables as aforesaid.
