

## FOR RETIREMENT OF OLD TEACHERS

Board of Education Considers  
Proposition Submitted by  
Supt. Christensen.

### ACT OF LAST LEGISLATURE

Authorities Placing of Pedagogues on  
Retired List at Half Pay After  
Thirty Years Service.

At the regular session of the board of education held last evening, the subject of teachers' pensions, as provided for by an act of the last legislature, was brought to the attention of the board by a communication from Supt. Christensen. The act referred to is house bill No. 188, by Richards, and provides for the retirement of teachers upon a pension. The provisions of the bill authorize the organization of a commission of seven, known as the public school teachers' retirement commission, two members of which are to be appointed by the board of education. A maintenance fund is provided, the nucleus of which is formed by contributions from the teachers themselves of 1 per cent of their salary. Other sources of income are provided for, among these being legacies, gifts, etc. Teachers may be retired on half pay after 30 years' service, through mental or physical incapacity to continue to perform the duties of a teacher, and the commission is appointed upon request of a majority of the teachers in any city of the first or second class to the education board. The matter was discussed at considerable length by the members, and was finally committed to the committee on school law.

### TREASURER'S REPORT.

Treasurer Whitney submitted a report, showing that during the month of February, the sum of \$206,649.25 was received, and \$60,205.98 paid out. The balance on hand is \$146,443.27. The board refused to sanction a proposition to the effect that principals be permitted to give notices in school of the appearance here of the Chicago Symphony orchestra in April.

### TEACHERS APPOINTED.

The following teachers were appointed: M. N. Hough, Amber Bardsley, Margaret Voe, John E. Todd, Mary C. Caulfield and Winnifred Woodmansee were released from their contracts as teachers. Unless Houghton, Mifflin & Company and D. C. Heath & Co. sign certain contracts for books before March 15, the same will be annulled, according to instructions given to the clerk of the board.

Plans will be secured by the committee on buildings and grounds for a new 12-room building on the new site near Walker's field, and the same committee will make provisions for additions to the Emerson and Riverside buildings.

### TO MAKE NEW PARK.

Proposition to Convert Six Acres in  
City Creek Canyon Into One.

A proposition to make a park on a tract of six acres owned by the municipality in City Creek canyon was discussed at a meeting of the park commission yesterday afternoon. Supt. Byham has been looking into the matter and will submit estimates to the proper authorities as to what it will cost to provide an additional place of recreation to the public. The place designated, it is claimed, would be an ideal spot for a park.

The commission received estimates from Mr. Byham as to the probable cost of parking east South Temple street from State to the city limits; Second South from Second East to Tenth East, and Sixth East from South Temple to Third South, as follows: Brigham, per front foot, \$1.39; total cost, \$22,601.57. Second South, per front foot, \$1.11; total cost, \$11,555. Sixth East, per front foot, 88 cents; total cost, \$3,484.

### MRS. DAVEY NOTIFIED.

Mrs. Frank E. Davey, who lies in an Oakland hospital near death's door, has been told of her husband's death, the suicidal phase being kept in the background. She bore up wonderfully well under the shock and some hope, although it has been known since she is critically ill. Mrs. E. H. Darmon, a sister, left this city last evening to be with the sick woman.

### ARTICLES DRAWN UP.

Manager O'Mara of the Auditorium association announced today that articles of incorporation for the new Auditorium Theater company have been drawn up and will be filed within a few days. The improvements on the rink will be started at the close of the roller skating season which will be the end of this month. Mr. O'Mara states that the rink will not be closed for skating until the date for the automobile show, which will be March 30, and the first four days of April.

### CONSIDER WATER RATES.

Council Committee and Supt. Hobday  
Hold Conference.

The council committee on water-works and Supt. Hobday of that department were in conference yesterday afternoon, and the subject of an increase of rates all down the line was thoroughly discussed. Large consumers pay at present anywhere from three and a half to eight cents per 1,000 gallons, but the proposed new schedule will raise the price to the unvarying amount of 10 cents per 1,000 gallons. In some instances the railroads and breweries are exempted, the cost under the change being about three times what it now is.

If the plans for increase of water-works revenue are brought to a conclusion, many ecclesiastical and charitable institutions and schools that have heretofore had special rates or the water entirely free will be compelled to pay the highest price. Residents of five rooms or less now paying \$4 will pay \$5, with 75 cents for each additional room, with like increase for apartments and all other purposes. The department will endeavor to increase its annual revenue at least \$50,000, and

to do it the present rates will necessarily have to be materially increased. Another saving to the department, proposed by the superintendent, is that of compelling contractors to pay for putting in extension pipes rather than to have the same paid for directly by the city.

## J. J. GREENEWALD'S UTAH INTERVIEW

Tells the Truth About Beehive  
State and the Mormons to  
Eastern Papers.

### HE SHATTERS MANY NOTIONS

That Pass as Current Facts Among  
The Uninformed People of Pennsylvania Generally.

Jacob J. Greenewald, surveyor of customs port of Salt Lake City, is back from a trip to his old home town in Pennsylvania. While east Mr. Greenewald sounded the sentiments of all classes and found almost a unanimous expression that Theodore Roosevelt would be eventually nominated for the third term, whether he liked it or not. "The people want him and they will have him," declares Mr. Greenewald.

While absent the surveyor of the port was interviewed a number of times on the prevailing conditions in Utah. Among the interviews is one in the Bradford, Pa., Evening Star of which R. P. Hapgood is the editor. Mr. Hapgood is a member of the legislature and has charge of the Knox campaign for western Pennsylvania. He visited Salt Lake about 15 months ago and during the 10 days he was here studied conditions generally in Utah.

The interview which appeared in the issue of Feb. 25 is displayed on the front page under the caption of "Truth About the Mormons." Hon. Jacob J. Greenewald of Salt Lake City, who has known the Mormons for 38 years, shatters many eastern notions about that people.

It follows:  
In an interview with a reporter for the Star today, he said the Mormon people are as good as any other. Their morals are good, they are industrious and virtuous. "You never see a Mormon beggar because the poor are cared for by their own people," said Mr. Greenewald. "About 1891, Wilford Woodruff, president of the Church, realizing that the United States was determined to root out polygamy, his great desire being for peace to his people, issued a manifesto, suspending the practice of polygamy and every unprejudiced mind in that country knows that the Church does not give its sanction to any such marriages since, and it is dying out of its own accord. Those who were in polygamy, however, could not be expected to throw out their wives and children upon the cold charity of the world. There are not a great many polygamists left in Utah. During the past 10 years more than two-thirds have died. All told, there are not over 400 in the entire state."

"CHURCH INTERFERENCE."  
"A great many people believe that the Church interferes in matters of politics. Let us analyze this question. In the last 13 years (since statehood) every judge of the supreme court has been and is non-Mormon. In Salt Lake district there are four judges, three Gentiles and one Mormon. There have been three representatives to Congress, two Gentiles and one Mormon, and in the United States senate, four Gentiles and two Mormons. In the last two municipal elections in Salt Lake City, the non-Mormon party has scored victories. If the Church had interfered as it is accused, it certainly could have changed the result."

A great many who belonged to the non-Mormon party believe that a man holding the position of United States senator should not be a high church man. Mr. Greenewald does not agree with that. Any citizen of the United States has the right to be ambitious, church or no church, he thinks. From 1870 until 1893, Mr. Greenewald was a member of the Liberal party (non-Mormon). The principles of that was to abolish polygamy, make woman queen of the home, and for free public schools. They accomplished their object and in 1893, they buried the hatchet.


Mr. Greenewald, being Pennsylvania born, labored to help make Utah Republican.

**FIGHT AGAINST SMOOT.**  
Speaking of the late fight made upon the Hon. Reed Smoot, Mr. Greenewald said that everybody who has the pleasure of his acquaintance knows that he is one of nature's noblemen, a good father, a model husband, a first class man, business man, financier, statesman, good citizen and American. It might perhaps be better if Smoot would resign his apostleship because his friends, who are legion, want him to be his own successor in the senate. The majority of the people believe Utah is benefited by continuing the present delegation, the Hon. George Sutherland, Reed Smoot and Joseph Howell, at the national capital. They could not be improved upon and the people do not desire any change. If Mr. Smoot should resign his apostleship, it would spike the guns of his enemies and the Gentile Republicans in Salt Lake City would all be back in the Republican fold in no time. "Our Gentile Democratic friends would be without a party

as their bridges are burnt irrevocably," he said. "Now if the people in the United States, especially in the east, would disabuse their minds of the prejudice that has always existed against the Mormon people and know them as they are today they would not listen to the paid informer who must make his living not by telling the truth (for then his occupation would be gone) but by false reports. They would be more charitable in their views and get over the idea that the Mormons are born with horns. The young Mormon," he says, "are eager for knowledge and to treat them as pariahs is un-American."

Their patriotism to Old Glory cannot be questioned. They demonstrated that in the Spanish-American war. If it had not been for the Utah batteries composed half of Mormons and half of Gentiles, the Pennsylvania soldiers from Pittsburgh and surrounding country would have been utterly annihilated in the Philippines. But this is a matter of history. Whenever Uncle Sam calls for men, the Mormon boys will be to the front first, and not second."

Mr. Greenewald has the distinguished honor of being the first 33rd degree Mason in the state of Utah.
