

The Work in Switzerland and Germany.—The following are from the *Millennial Star*—

"BERN, Oct. 8.—From the time I arrived here until the beginning of last March, I labored nearly all the time in Germany, without being able to make much headway. Since March my time has been chiefly spent in Bern, in office business, translating, publishing, etc.

"We published this summer an edition of 1,000 hymn-books; quite recently an edition of 10,000 pamphlets, of which I send you sample per this mail. Now I am busily engaged in getting the Book of Doctrine and Covenants printed, which I hope will be accomplished by March. About one fifth of the Book had been previously published by Elder Haeser and Schoenfeld in the 'Stern,' which will be quite a help to me; the balance is new translation, the greater part of which I have already done, and the remainder I hope to be able to do while the printing is progressing.

"Our Mission Record shows that from Jan. 1, 1875, to date, there were baptized: in the West Conference 76, in the East Conference 41, in the German Conference 18 new members—making a total of 130 persons. In the year ending December 31, 1874, we baptized 95 individuals. There is a fair prospect ahead.

"Winterthur, Oct. 6.—I am at present, in connection with brother Theurer, visiting the Branches in East Swiss Conference, holding meetings with the Saints in each Branch; strengthening them in their faith and encouraging them to live nearer to the Lord their God. Our meetings all through the conference are pretty well attended by the Saints, and at most of them we have strangers present. In some places we have our meetings published in the newspapers, inviting the people to come out and hear us; but in many instances it brings out but few. We have had some cases, however, when we had large meetings. You know in this country we cannot hold out-door meetings, and we must therefore try and reach the people some other way; to this end we had a pamphlet printed, which we distribute gratis, and being assisted by the Saints in circulating it, many will get acquainted with the principles of the gospel.

"I can say the work is progressing favorably, and although we do not baptize quite as many as we did the first half of the year, yet we find a few from time to time that are willing to enlist to serve God and cast in their lot with his people.

"In Germany we have not accomplished much yet. Brother Walser, who has labored there for a few weeks, returned to Bern September 27th ult. Brother Theurer has labored a short time in the centre of Germany, and will go back there in a week or two.

"We are getting along nicely in publishing the Book of Doctrine and Covenants, in the German language, and hope to be able to offer it to the Saints and the public before the close of the year.

"The brethren all feel well. Brother Theurer is presiding over East Swiss Conference; brother Walser over West Swiss Conference. We have also two native travelling Elders in the field, who labor faithfully, one in each Conference. Elder Eyring is laboring in the office. The calculation was, at one time, to have a fall emigration, but there were only three or four ready, and we considered it best to put it off till next spring, as it will save time and expense. J. U. Growing in Favor.—Home manufactured goods, in some directions, at least, are growing in public favor. The home produced article of boots and shoes is largely in demand at Z. C. M. I. shoe department, and two thirds of the sales at the Workingmen's Co-operative Association are of the same class. The home made article is generally so much superior in point of wear as to bear no comparison with the imported.

At Z. C. M. I. boot and shoe department we have seen samples of white dressed sheep skins, suitable for shoe linings and top dressing, of boots, manipulated from the pelts by a man named Morris, a resident of the 11th Ward, who, in the absence of machinery, does the labor by hand, producing an article that is of better quality than that brought here from abroad. All he wants is a moderate amount of

capital, being a poor man, to establish a very useful branch of industry that would stop another leak that drains the money out of the country.

As soon as practicable he proposes preparing colored dressed skins, which are much more extensively in use than the white.

#### Dress of the Disco Girls.

The Disco costume appears very funny until you get accustomed to it, but rather pretty nevertheless. Imagine a pretty girl—and three or four of the Disco girls are very pretty—with her hair done up in a kind of topknot on the top of the head with a red ribbon, a loose fitting jacket made of any kind of light, thin stuff and of any color, trimmed with a fur collar and made to put on just like a shirt, but reaching only to the waist; a pair of seal skin breeches, with the hairy side out, reaching nearly to the knee and confined there with a garter; a pair of high boots, meeting the bottom of the trousers, the feet and ankles of red leather, the tops of white linen, starched and ironed, and with a little roll of fur around the tops, and the darkest, demurest eyes and the sunniest brown complexion ever painted by the sunshine and the sea breezes and the ocean spray—and you have a faint idea of a Disco girl. You should see them tripping about in their little red boots, with their little short steps scarcely seeming to touch the ground, so soft is their tread, or springing over the rocks like young antelopes, to know how charming a girl may be in breeches. And they have the daintiest little feet and hands, too—feet and hands that would make the prettiest New York girl burst with envy if she saw them; so finely shaped, so small, so delicate and yet so strong. —*Cor. IRON COLUMNS IN BUILDINGS.—By a recent invention, the principle of the fire-proof safe is applied to the formation of iron pillars or columns in architecture. As in the case of the common iron pillar in use, a solid cast iron column sustains the whole weight of the superstructure; but, in this improved arrangement, there is outside of the solid column a thin cast iron shell, and the space intervening between the outer shell and the inner column is filled with plaster of paris, the non-conducting properties of which are well known. No weight is allowed to rest on the outer shell or the non-conducting that is used as filling, their only mission being to protect from the effects of heat the real support of the building—the inner column. The plan is to have these columns surmounted by an iron T girder, which is enclosed in a fire-proof casting of a similar nature, and the junction between the pillar and the girder is so formed that only the protected portion of one touches the protected portion of the other, while the casting forms a tight joint, thus making the fire-proof of armor complete. The simplicity and efficiency of this plan are obvious. These columns, it is stated, are intended to take the place of the ordinary iron column in ornamental fronts of buildings, as well as the interior of large warehouses, where such supporters are needed.—*Ex.*
