Weber County Teachers- School Calendar-Probate Matters - Injunction and Other Water Suits,

Wm.C. Weaver, as receiver of the water works system, against Ogden City, in the Circuit Court of Appeals, at St, Louis, the highest court into which the case could be taken, obtained a judgment against the city for about \$25,000 and yesterday the receiver started to levy on the city property to satisfy the judgment. At the city council meeting Monday night Mr. L. E. Rogers in behalf of the water company presented the judgment for payment, the matter was discussed and referred to the comnittee on laws. This did not meet with Weaver's approval in every respect, yesterday morning when he received a communication from the comceived a communication from the com-mittee asking for an itemized state-ment. Mr. Weaver, considered the re-quest, as he said to a "News" repre-sentative, "school boys blay," and felt that the city council was trying to evade the settlement as long as possible. and yesterday afternoon Deputy U. Marshal Smith came up from Salt Lake with the execution, and served the pa-pers on members of the city council and proceeded to find out what property owned by the city would be the best to evy on. Marshal Smith called on City Preasurer Moyes and asked what funds the city had on hand and was informed that there were no funds, but later in the evening Mr. Moyes told Mr. Smith that he had some funds and would furnish him with a statement this moraling. BURIAL OF A MISSIONARY.

Elder William Clayson's Remains Tenderly Laid to Rest.

Colonia Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico. July 10.-On Saturday, 6th inst., the remains of Elder William Clayson, who recently died in West Virginia, and rived in this place, accompanied by El-der John G. McQuatrie, president of the Eastern States mission; and on Sunday funeral servicese in his honor were held in the auditorium of the academy, which was beautifully decorated in white, and with beautiful flowers and rare plants. When the funeral cortege, preceded by the band, of which he was a member, arrived, the house was filled to overflowing.

After singing by the choir and prayer by Patriarch J. H. Martineau, Bishop J. C. Bentley introduced Elder McQuarrie, who addressed the meeting in a most instructive and interesting disourse. He spoke in terms of the highest esteem and love of our departed brother, and said that as a faithful nissionary he was pre-eminent: his whole soul was wrapped up in his work; he was always ready for any duty; was always cheerful, and was greatly beloved by his fellow laborers. He was truly an honor to the Saints of Mexico whom he represented, and, had he lived, would have been called to a

higher position in the mission. Elder Clayson was taken with what the doctor called a mild form of ty-phoid fever which did not seem alarmng, but notwithstanding ail the tender ministrations of his friends he steadily failed and grew weaker until his change came, suffering but little if any pain. A week ago he sat up, was creeerful, and thought he would soon be able to renew his missionary labors. He then slept a few hours and upon awakening a decided relapse was apparent, from which he never rallied, but passed peacefully to his glorious rest. Truly has it been said: "Blessed are they who die in the Lord."

later McQuarrie's remarks were most eloquent and comforting, as were those of President A. W. Ivins, who followed and of Bishop Bentley, who concluded, both of whom testified in the strongest manner to the integrity and worth of the deceased as proved during his residence and labors in Mexico.""ha remains were escorted to the

cemetery by the choir and band and many vehicles and laid to rest.

That Elder Clayson's remains were permitted to be brought to his home was a special dispensation from Providence, for the laws of Mexico prohibit the entrance of any corpse from the United States for sanitary reasons, and especially so in case of death by contaguous disease, such as typhoid fever. At first the Mexican officials declared that the body could not enter Mexico. but finally permission was granted. This is the first case in which such a thing has been allowed since our settlement in Mexico, where it is difficult, even, to move a body from one town or cemetery to another, the Mexican officlais not permitting it usually.
