CHEYENNE, WYO. SHEEP AND CATTLEMEN GLAD

Forest Reserve Controversy Amicably Settled.

Special Correspondence, Cheyenne, Wyo., Sept. 30.-Advice, eccived here from Mesteetse indicati that the controversy over the conduct of the Yellowstene and Big Horn forest reserve: which has agitated the peo-ple of that section all summer, may be settled annicably in the near future. At the recent meeting with Chief Forester Pirchet the following recommendations

were agreed upon; "All of the resources of the reserves should be used so as to make them per-

manent.

"Small owners and actual residents should be given preference over large owners and non-residents." "The dominant interest of this region should be considered first, with as little domage to m for interests as possible," "Sudden changes in the reserves should be avoided in all cases, and where cosinges are contemplated due notice should be given."

The meeting was attended by repre-
