Now, as to our claim of the right to teach and preach our religion. Freedom of speech and of the press is one of the guaranties of the Constitution. Under that guaranty we have the right to preach what we believe to be true, no matter if all the world thinks it is false, if we can peaceably get any one to listen to our teachings. We have as good a right to preach "Mormonism" s Catholics have to preach H or as infidels have to preach Ing ism. We have no right to interio with them, they have no right to infere with us. Will any same person attempt to deny this?

Suppose it is true that the practice of lural marriage has been made a c rime by statute; or going further, suppose it is as wrong and immoral as its opments try to make it appear. Still to the most ordinary mortals, trample we have the right to explain our views | with fiendish cruelty upon the bleedconcerning it, in public, in private, by ing hearts of women made widows tolce or by the press. There is no law against its advocacy. If such a law red hand of the merciless assassin. ould be enacted it would be in open violation of that clause of the Constitution to which we have alluded. If people do not choose to read or listen to the arguments in favor of our belief, they are at liberty to refrain from giving their attention. We do not force our opinions upon them. If they can only be met with violence it exhibits a powerful weakness" on the part of those who dislike or dispute them. It shows that they cannot find reasons strong enough to bring against them or they would not resort to force.

As we have substantiated by irrefutable evidence, our Elders do not go from this place to preach that which the law forbids in practice. But we maintain that if they did go out-with that special object, so long as they broke no law-and there is no law against such preaching-they could not be lawfully punished nor interfered with. We have a plain and indisputable constitutional right to preach polygamy in any part of the United States where the people are willing to listen to us, so long as we make no disturbance of local regulations. We have just as much right to preach in favor of polygamy as other people have to preach against it. If not, where is the law that forbids one

more than the other? If we have the right to freedom of speech and of the press, we also have the right to be protected therein. That as a proposition that cannot be denied more than the other. We claim the protection of the law wherein we do not violate the law. But we claim the rotection of the Government only in the legitimate sphere of the Government. The parsgraph quoted above says we claim that it is "the duty of the Government to protect" us in preaching "anything we please in the name of religion." We need not deny this to people here. The fact that it is stated in the disreputable sheet we have named is sufficient to indicate that it is either a direct lie of such a perversion of the truth as to make it nearly the same. We hold the author-ities of any State, county or city responsible for the infraction of its laws to protect the rights of citizens, when those officials make no proper effort to here
